### Swim Pool Spring Cleaning Estimated Cost is \$6800

An estimated expenditure of \$6800 is needed to put the community swimming pool in operation this summer, council was told on Monday in a letter from the Community Centres Board.

The pool needs painting, filtration tanks must be caulked and other repairs made, said Cr. Bill Smith, a board member. Paint alone will cost \$1,000, he said.

Since it was given to the town by the Lions' Club the pool has been self-supporting, operating on receipts. The 1965 statement shows a small surplus of \$537.

While agreeing that the pool must be maintained, council would add nothing to the estimates which had already been approved for striking of the tax rate.

Instead, it was decided that the money must come from the grant to the Board of Parks which operates the arena.
