### Smith-Blasts Budget

out a \$38,000 deficit," he remarked. "I don't think voters would have objected to an increase of a mill or two."

He wondered how the town could do anything with the Cedarvale property with only a maintenance budget of \$4,000.

Deputy Reeve Young said there is no allowance for services to new factories which may be built, that a new bridge on the 9th Line is impossible and a proposed town garage.

"It looks—as if we'll have to deplete everything we can't afford in the budget, but I'll have to go along with it," he continued.

Cr. Emmerson said he was sorry all members had not attended the finance meetings where the budget was threshed out.

"If so, they would see this is a fair budget and it now puts the onus on all of us to streamline and make our operations more efficient," he said.

"I attended one of the three meetings," replied Cr. Smith, "and I couldn't have sold my idea if I'd attended ten."

Cr. Ballentine said he had favoured a one or two mill increase last year, and thinks ratepayers would rather have taxes advance a bit every year or two rather than one big increase which he says must come one year.

"We can only hold boards so long before they throw up their hands and resign," he warned. "Why is it that places like the Glen and Norval can have lighted ball parks and a town this size can't?"

Reeve Hunter said council is using money expected from the sale of industrial land to hold the mill rate and opined that this should go into a separate fund which could be used to buy more land later.

"I had hoped the thirty to forty thousand dollars necessary to improve the 9th Line bridge would have replaced last year's highway improvements in our budget," he said. "Now we are only to do it by issuing debentures."

He said he would go along with the budget reluctantly, but doesn't think council will be in any better position a year from now.

"Where are we going to get the money for services on the 9th Line if there is development there this year?" he asked.

Only Cr. Smith opposed the budget when it came to a vote.

"This is one year we are wise to standardize our rate," summed Mayor Gibbons. "We are on the threshold of advancement which will create more commercial and industrial assessment and next year at this time I expect we will be talking about lower, instead of higher taxes."

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## More People Than Ever Deposit in Blood Bank

A "first" and a new record were established at a blood donor clinic in Knox Church Hall Monday. The first was the introduction of a new plastic blood pack which took the place of the glass bottles. The record was number of volunteer donors and actual donations.

Three hundred and ninety-four people offered their blood, twenty two of which were rejected, for a total of 372 donations, a new high. Among the donors, and one of the reasons for the new record, was a large number of high school students.

The clinic, which is operated by the Georgetown branch of the Canadian Red Cross, included one more bed than in past clinics enabling the clinic staff to expedite the rate of donations.

A Georgetown Red Cross branch official said the length of time donors have to make their donation could be reduced even more if some of the evening donors could attend the clinic in the afternoon. She pointed out that baby sitting facilities are available at the clinic.
