Raiders Claim League Pennant — Choose Hornets First Hurdle

It will be Georgetown Raiders and Orangeville Hornets in the OHA Junior C Central League quarter finals which get under way here Sunday afternoon. Raiders chose Orangeville after beating them 6-1 here last Sunday in the final game of the regular schedule, a win which guaranteed Georgetown the league pennant.

They have not lost a game since January 3rd when they faltered on Milton ice.

A crowd of 500 watched Sunday as Rod Presswood locked up the league title for his mates and threw away the key. The cool defense player scored four times and then won a scrap with Orangeville's Garry Milton in the third period for a full afternoon.

The quarter final will be a best 4-of-7 series. The dates for the other games in the series have yet to be decided on.

The other six playoff teams will be paired off at a meeting of team reps tonight.

With the schedule close to completion at writing time the standings look like this. Georgetown on top with 55 pts. New Hamburg 52, Milton 48, Hanover 39, Simcoe 33, Elmira 31, Orangeville 25 and Paris 24.

These top eight will enter the quarter final rounds. Eliminated are Brantford 22, Preston 20, Dundas 16, and Hespeler 9.

Georgetown Raiders indicated they like to play under pressure. With New Hamburg Hahns walking on their heels during the last part of the schedule Raiders came through with 14 straight wins, the longest win streak of any team in the campaign.

Doug Selby and Paul Robinson scored the remaining goals for Georgetown. Raiders' Masked marvel, Tommy Ayres, had a 6-0 shutout going for him until N. Davidson spoiled things with Orangeville's only goal with 7 minutes left.

Raiders led 2-0 after one period, Presswood, from Ron Lafé at 9:02, and again from Doug Selby at 13:39. And after two periods it was 4-0, Presswood's 3rd from Paul Robinson and Terry Lane at 2:27 and Paul Robinson from Ron Lane and Russ Hartley on a breakaway at 15:40.

Doug Selby scored with help from Mike Cummins and Ken Morrow at 3:21 of the third, and then Presswood notched his 4th from Ron Lane and Robinson at 6:46. Davidson's goal was unassisted at 13 minutes.
