The locals will be still warm from a successful five exhibition string in which they beat

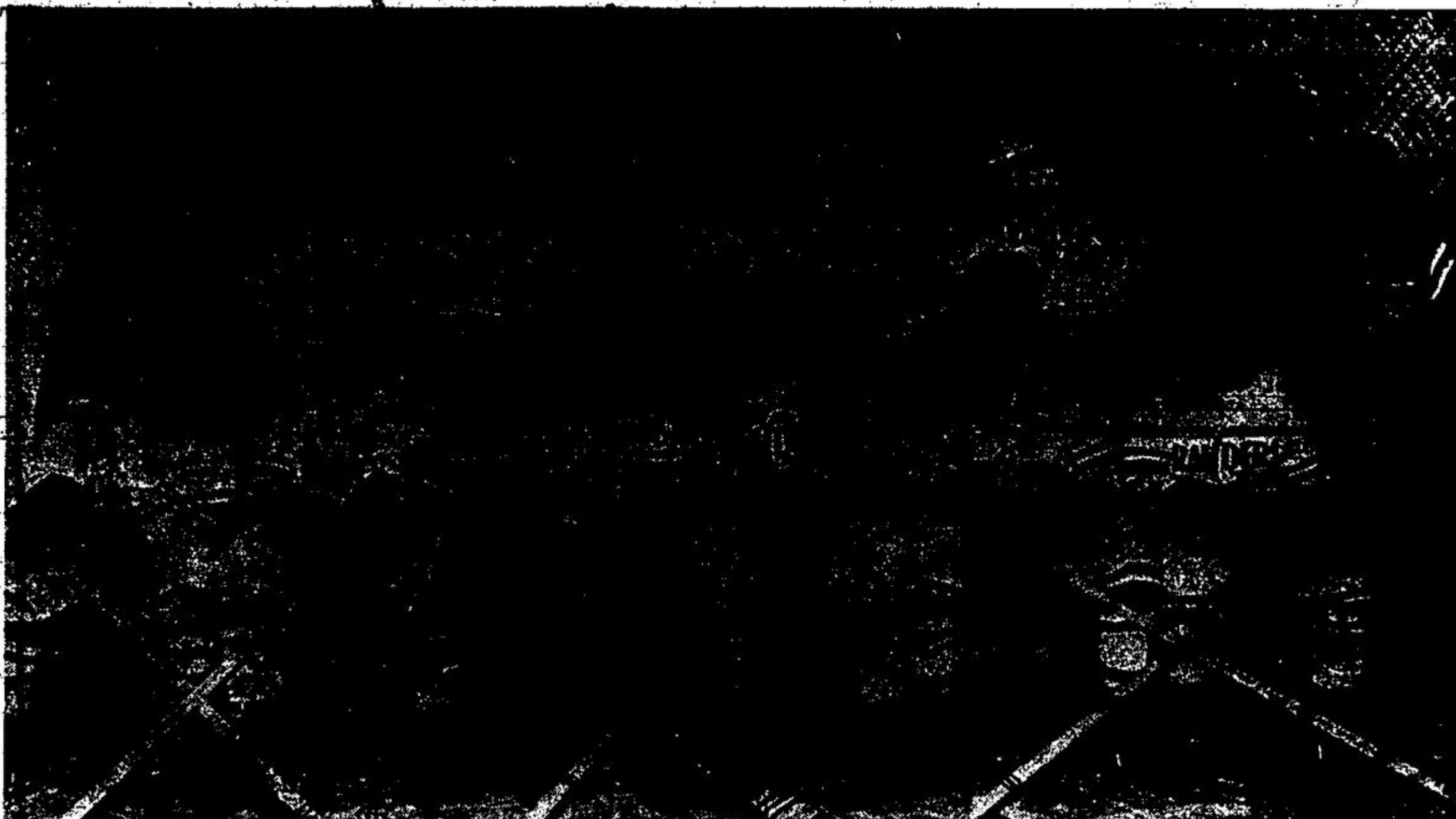

If Georgetown Bantam Pontiac beat Winona in Georgetown Memorial arena tonight there'll be a lot of supporters let out their breath which they have been holding since Tues. Feb. 15 when the local Bants dropped the first game of their best of 3 OMHA playoff series 3 to 1.

Since then Georgetown Bantams have come on to knot the net at one game apiece setting the stage for the deciding clash here.

Georgetown staged off elimination in Hamilton's Scott Park Arena Monday when they jolted Winona 4-1 in a game in which they looked much more like the team that won the Tri-County Bantam League championship.

Marty Fowler scored for Georgetown to open the scoring at 7:35 of the first period with Bill Neil assisting. Winona drew even after just 40 seconds of the middle period frame and it stayed that way until half way through the period when Pontiac went ahead to stay. Fowler scored the go-ahead goal from Doug Hills. Hay added another to make it 3-1 a minute later on a pass from Inglis, and he hit for his second on an unassisted effort in the third period when he faked the Winona defense men out of their skates, then drew the goalie out and dumped the puck in the open net.

The whole team went full out to gain this win on ice conditions that were sub-standard. A large number of Georgetown people were on hand to add moral support.

Tonight's deciding game starts at 7 o'clock.

CWOSSA Honours, Wrestling Team Sweeps Kitchener Meet

Georgetown District High School wrestling team walked off with the CWOSSA wrestling championship Saturday.

This was the first year CWOSSA has held a major tournament to determine a regional champion. The tournament held at Eastwood Collegiate in Kitchener saw fourteen teams from all over Central Western Ontario competing for the honours.

The Georgetown boys set a bold task of winning in a determined fashion, and when the smoke of the preliminaries had cleared, they had left little doubt in anyone's mind that they had come to win. Eight of the twelve man team were in the championships. Backing up the champions were two second and two third place finishes.

The resounding victory was a rich reward for coach Lyn McLaren, who was convinced that Georgetown could compete successfully, the end result of above average, talented boys, who worked hard and disciplined themselves.

There were many highlights to the day long tourney. Ray Burrows returned to form to win the 148 lb. class with three successive pins. George Ferguson and Doug Hills added to their undefeated records at 115 and 157 lbs. respectively. Barry Smith won the 185 lb. class by defeating the top seeded wrestler. Tom Connelly 88 and Al Ferguson 141 each won three matches to take their championships. Jim Hall 123 and Jim Blair, heavyweight, reached the finals and lost close bouts. Bill Hall 136 and Jim Scarlett had three wins, and one loss records to place third in their divisions. Bob Hill 106 and Bob Smith 183 failed to place, but also picked up valuable team points.

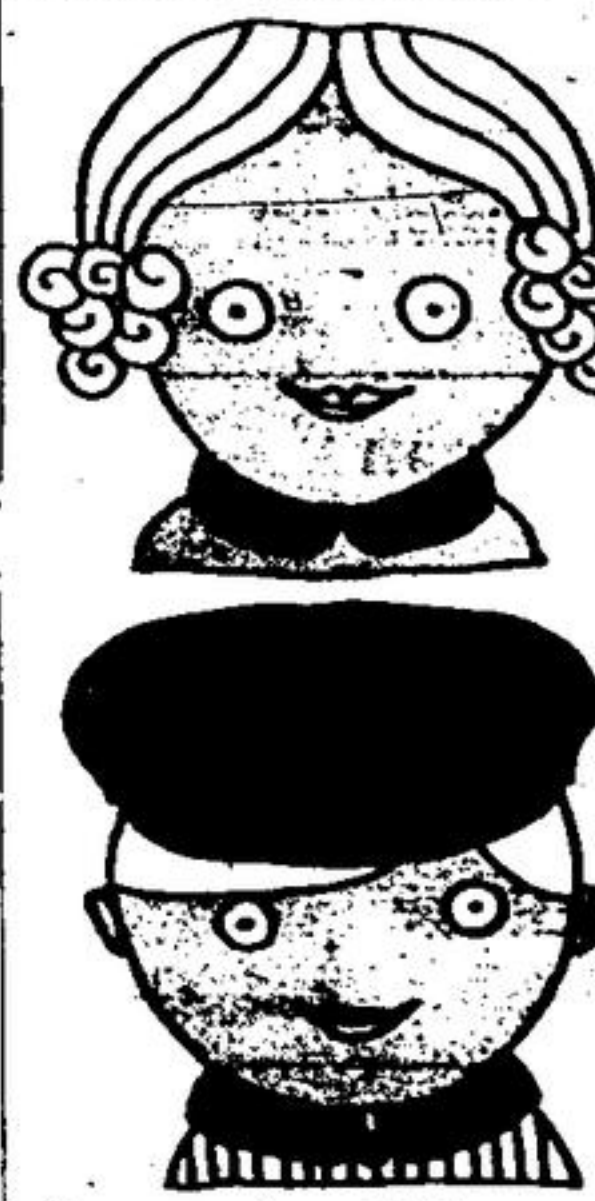
