Acknowledging the good work that Scouting does among young Georgetown boys, town council proclaimed this week as Boy Scout Week on Monday. Special displays and demonstrations in the park Saturday will attract large numbers of people there.

Building Permit Fees Boosted in Georgetown

A sharp upward revision in fees for building permits will be finalized at next week's council meeting.

Terminating Georgetown's fees 'badly outdated' Cr. Ern Hyde moved Monday for a by-law revision which would establish a charge of \$1.00 per \$1,000 for the first valuation of \$1,000, and \$2.50 for each additional \$1,000. There would be a minimum charge of \$2.50.

Mr. Hyde explained as an example that a \$350,000 industrial building would pay a fee of \$882.50.

"This is about right," he said. "In Acton the fee would be a hundred dollars less and in Chingacousy a hundred dollars more."

Georgetown will have a higher residential fee than most towns, he added.

Third reading of the by-law revision was delayed a week when Reeve Hunter said he wanted to give more consideration to the residential fee.

Deputy reeve Young said that council should also consider upping fees charged for linking homes with town services.

"We're losing money on these now," he said.
