INSIDE & OUTSIDE ARMOURY WHERE THE "ACTION 66" IS

Canada's big names in exploration will be depicted by Cubes inside Georgetown armoury Saturday afternoon, while outside, Scouts and Rovers go about the business of surviving fire, nuclear fallout, wilderness and winter. It's all part of Action '66, Georgetown district Scouts and Cubs way of marking Boy Scout Week in Canada.

The Cubs will use costumes, art work, maps and authentic equipment to bring to life such famous Canadian explorers as Henry Hudson, William Henry Champlain, Vancouver, Malaspina, Laverdure, and many others.

Packs from 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th (A and B) Georgetown, Norval, Glen Williams, and Hornby will take part.

An actual fire in the survival from fire demonstrations will be one of the highlights of the Scout displays. Georgetown firefighters will stand by while the Rovers do their escape act.

Traps, snares, outdoor cooking and brush shelters will be part of the display on survival in the wilderness, and other types of shelters including an igloo if the snow conditions are right, will be included in a winter survival demonstration.

Flames Damage Church Room But Noon Mass Uninterrupted

A fire in a room in the downstairs section of the new Holy Cross Church Sunday failed to interrupt a mass, being conducted in the chapel.

The blaze started in a waste paper basket in a room under the altar and did damage to the floor, wall and ceiling. Fire Chief Erwin Lewis estimated the loss at less than \$100.

The fire started when an altar boy dumped live ashes into a paper filled waste basket thinking they were dead.

The alarm was turned in shortly after 12 noon. The flames were doused before firemen arrived.

It was the second fire call in three days for the Georgetown fire fighters.

Friday afternoon they used dry chemical to check flames in an overheated space heater at the home of Miss Jessie Leavitt, 5 Ontario St. There was no damage.

Domtar Employee Later Worked For City Bank

A former Georgetown man, Jack Makin succumbed to a heart attack at his home in Toronto on February 12.

Mr. Makin, who lived at 18 Rivercrest Rd. was a retired employee of the Bloor Street branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia.

He married Mary Perry fifty years ago last May in a ceremony in St. George's Anglican Church here, with the late Rev. Higginson officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Makin lived on Albert St. in the present Cedric Cross home, and he was employed at the Alliance (now Domtar) paper mill.

He leaves his wife, and a brother Albert Makin in England. Funeral service took place last Wednesday at the Turner & Porter York Chapel and interment was made in Parklawn Cemetery.

Two Injured when Car Strikes Tree

Two men were treated in hospital after the car they were riding in left Main St. South, travelled for 70 feet along the west ditch and rammed into a tree early Sunday morning, February 13th.

Thomas Shea, of 134 Main St., Brampton, and Douglas Davies, 23, of 33 Edward Street were treated by Dr. J. P. Martin at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital and released.

Shea suffered a bruised right arm, and Davies a back injury. Georgetown P.C. William Oakley said the car, driven by Davies, was northbound on Main St. when it left the road just north of Maple Ave.

Damage to the 1961 Corvair was estimated at \$1,500. The accident happened at 11 o'clock in the morning.

Tree Varieties, Planting Tips Explained by Sheridan Expert

Tree planting received special attention at the Georgetown Horticultural Society's public meeting in Knox Church Hall on Wednesday evening of last week. With Centennial Year approaching it seemed as though there was an increased interest in this effort as judged from the large turnout despite the stormy evening.

Mr. Joe Pokluda of Sheridan Nurseries, Glen Williams, was the guest speaker and from his wide knowledge and experience was able to offer good advice to all who had come to the meeting with questions on their minds.

In his comments on suitable varieties for home planting he dealt first with the Almey and Royal varieties of Flowering crab which had been specially chosen as Centennial trees. Next he mentioned the Linden, a fine shade tree, the Ironwood, a possible substitute for the disease-ridden elm, the Norway maple where drainage is good, or the red maple (Acer rubrum) where more tolerance of high moisture was required.

Then there was also the birch, red oak and the mulberry (either white or weeping variety) and the locusts of which he preferred the skyline to the less shapely shademaster or the less hardy sunburst.

Next he turned to a discussion of what the tree planter might do to ensure a pleasing result. He stressed the importance of ample root room in the hole that was made, as well as provision for plant food and drainage to get the young tree started, pruning needed, etc. He also offered some useful tips in the planting and care of shrubs and roses and answered many questions from the audience.

Mr. J. Duffield thanked the speaker for his informative discussion.

Robert Barber, as chairman, announced that plans were under way for a full program of meetings and projects again this year and committees have been appointed.

At the next meeting, on March 16th, it was expected that Mr. Charles Warner, fruit and vegetable extension specialist from the Dept. of Agriculture at Milton, would be guest speaker. Mr. Barber also reminded the members of the fine Spring Garden Show to be put on by the Garden Clubs of Toronto at O'Keefe Centre, March 8 - 13.

COULD WASH CAR IN SUNDAY BEST WITH NEW SYSTEM

Ever wash your car wearing your best suit? You could without worrying about ending up looking like a wet rag at Georgetown's latest convenience for do-it-yourselfers a 25c car wash, which opened last weekend at 351 Guelph St. E.

The secret according to the management is the spraying system in which the soft warm water is atomized under 500 pounds pressure which means no back-lash.

For another dime motorists using the facilities can use a vacuum to clean their car's interior, and radiant heat is also available.

An air drying system will dry the cars and leave no streaks, but for the perfectionists who like a dazzling finish wiping sheets are available at 3 for 10c.

The new approach to car cleaning originated in the USA and was just recently introduced in Canada.

"We've even had people use the facilities to wash their dogs, cats and Venetian blinds," the local manager told the Herald, "but our happiest customers are the ones who use it to wash big items like trucks, trailers and even boats. They find it a much less expensive way of keeping their vehicles clean."

The Georgetown operation has four service bays so no one is kept waiting.
