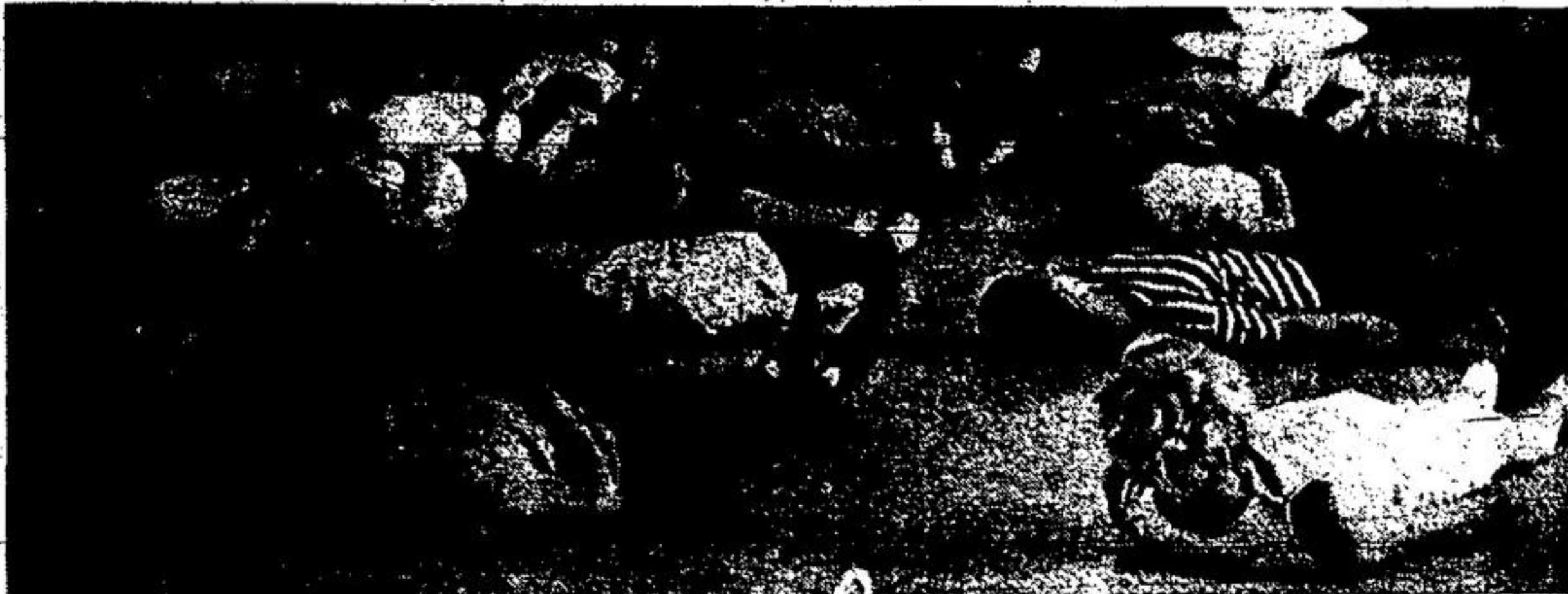
The exercise sessions are a weekly affair, but the guests will vary. The March 1 speaker

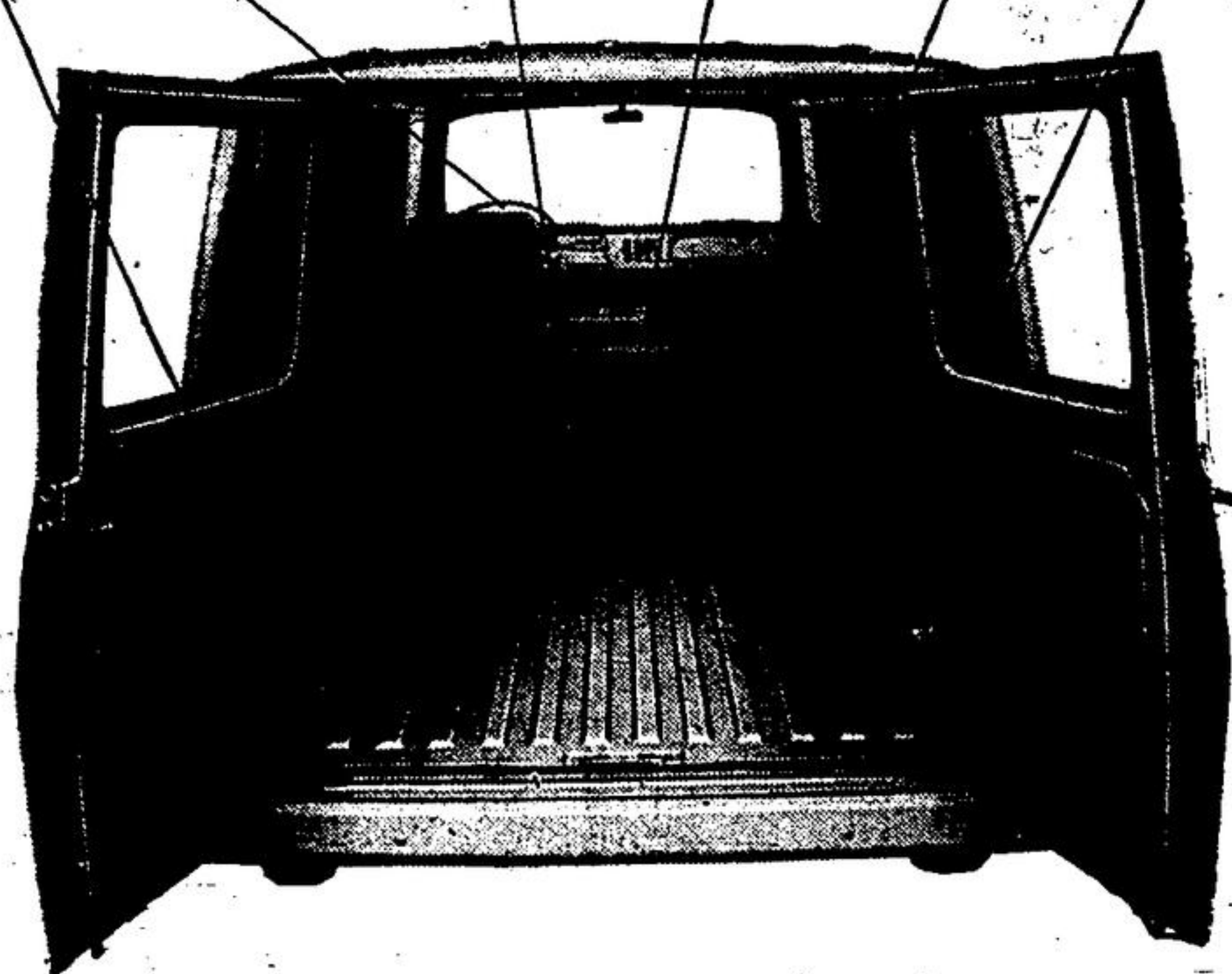
