Starrest Jersey Class Leader for 2-Year-Olds

Two Georgetown area Jersey cows were among the Jersey Class Leaders for the month of January in Canada according to a news release from the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club.

In the senior four year old class the highest record was made by Brampton Line Dreamer, a daughter of Brampton Graceful Dreamer, bred and owned by B.H. Bull and son, Norval. Her production at 4 years 222 days, in 305 days was 13,067 lbs. milk, 738 lbs. fat for 5.65 per cent, a Silver and Gold medal record.

In the senior two year old class Starrest Commando Betty, a daughter of Marlu Commando Milestone, bred and owned by A. Neilson Stark, Georgetown, had the highest record. Commando at 2 year 206 days, in 305 days, she produced 11,285 lbs. milk, 541 lbs. fat, for 4.79 per cent, a Silver Medal record.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Bridge would be a very easy game if we could produce a set of rules which said "always do this" or "never do that!" Fortunately we cannot make up rules like this. I say fortunately because it would take all the fun out of the game.

There is one rule, however, that comes close to being an "always" rule. This rule says "Always take out trump unless you have a good reason not to." One of the best reasons for not taking out trump that I know is — if you take out trump — you won't make the contract.

Here is a good hand to illustrate this point. This hand occurred at the Erin Bridge Club last week.

Dedicate New Flag at Service For Norval's Scout Groups

Add Free Phone Calls to Milton Next Year

Georgetown's telephone rates will not be increased when toll-free calling from Milton to Georgetown goes into effect.

At present Georgetowners may call Acton, Brampton, Huttonville, Victoria and Snelgrove on a toll-free basis, and by November, 1967, Milton will be included.

Milton Council endorsed the Bell Telephone proposal providing toll-free calls to Burlington, Oakville and Georgetown at a recent council meeting.

Area manager Arnold Blachford explained that Georgetown was in Grade Number 7, meaning in an area with between 20,001 and 50,000 accessible telephones. The addition of Milton's 5,200 telephones would not bring Georgetown anywhere near the next bracket. The rates are established by the number of 'phones accessible in the calling area.

Milton's rates will increase, since with the addition of Burlington, Oakville and Georgetown to their toll-free area, they will jump from Grade 7 to Grade 8.

Milton council asked for Acton's inclusion in their toll-free area, but Mr. Blachford explained that Acton council's endorsement would be necessary, since Acton's rate would rise if this were done.

"A big step toward pulling the County together," commented Area Manager Arnold Blachford, in discussing the extension of toll-free calling.

Recall Limehouse History In Bruce Trail Newsletter

An article of particular interest in this area was published in the January issue of the Toronto Bruce Trail Club's newsletter. The article is titled "Lime Kilns to See On and Around the Trail" and was written by John and Olive Byers. The article follows:

Perhaps as you have been tracing your way towards a section of the trail in the Georgetown area, you have passed through the quiet little village of Limehouse, now a small rural community of about 250 people. You may have noticed the village store, the little church, and the new school situated at the west end of the village.

But did you know that at one time this was a thriving community, providing work for hundreds of hard working settlers? Around the middle of the last century, the Grand Trunk (GNR) Line was pushed through and within a short time, the village had three hotels, three stores, two curries, several big mills (wool, paint, lime) and a lime industry from which the settlement derives its name.

MORE EFFICIENT

The draw kiln was a tall structure and much more efficient than the one we just described. The stacking of the wood and the limestone was basically the same, but a grating was added between the wood and stone. "Cooking" took approximately three days and once this initial period had elapsed, lime could be drawn off every six hours.

Good examples of both types can still be seen in the village today. The old kiln is the older type — a short, squat looking structure. Wood was placed in the kiln and limestone piled on top to a height of six feet. The
