## Make Best of Raiders' Sins Hornets Own One Game Lead

While all other favored quarter finalists took expected leads in their first round OHA Junior C Central League sets Georgetown Raiders were choking on the 7th place morsel they chose for their first course.

Despite a strong third period bid to reduce an Orangeville Hornet-margin-Raiders' presented too little too late and suffered a 6-4 setback at the hands of the club playing David's role in this meeting with the league Goliaths.

Penalties were the weight that tipped the scales toward Hornets. Raiders ran into 26 of them to 19 for the visitors.

Georgetown was at their full strength for just one of Orangeville's half dozen goals.

They were two men short when Kowalchuk opened things at 1:21 from Watts. Workman pushed Orangeville 2 up from White three minutes later while two Raiders watched from the penalty bench. And the third Hornets market scored by Watts at 9:57, took advantage of Georgetown being one man short.

Ron Lane managed Georgetown's first goal without help at 16:13. Each team added one goal to their totals in the middle period. Raiders were again using 5 men to Orangeville's 6 when Workman gave his club a 4-1 advantage from White at 16:24.

Bob Allen converted Ruse Hartley's pass into Georgetown's second goal a minute later. Don Norton fed Hartley to start the play.

Closest Raiders got all afternoon at 3:47 when Paul Robinson notched the first of his pair from Rod-Presswood to make it a respectable 4-3. Georgetown was at full strength when Porritt widened the gap to 2 goals again from Workman at 4:59, but Robinson struck again at 5:15 from Ron Lane and it was a 5-4 game with suffic-

ient time left for a patented Raider finish. It didn't come.

Instead, Porritt whipped a Workman pass into the Raider cage at 13:17 to complete the coup: Raiders were trying to survive another two minute minor at the time.

Mixed in with the string of minor sentences were three majors, a ten minute misconduct to Georgetown's Don Norton, and fighting majors to Terry Lane, Raiders, and G. Milton, Orangeville.

Raiders will try to go straight and even the series in the Hornets' nest tonight (Thursday).

The third game of the best of seven series will also be set in Orangeville. It's scheduled for Saturday with the fourth game here Sunday afternoon. If a 5th game is necessary it will be played in Georgetown Memorial Arena Tuesday night. Teams would return to Orangeville for the sixth, Tuesday, Jan. 10th, and to Georgetown, Sunday, March 13th for the seventh.

In the other series, Milton is playing Brantford, New Hamburg is playing Simcoe, and Elmira is meeting Hanover.

## Dozers Carve New Fairways Out of North Halton Woods

Eager golfers are watching the large bulldozer literally chew its way through trees and brush cutting fairways for the eighteen hole golf course at the North Halton Golf & Country Club which will be fully in operation by the spring of 1967.

Golfers will not be deprived of their favourite sport, however, since nine holes will be in play while construction is underway.

The woody character of the course will be preserved with only the necessary trees and underbrush removed. The sides of the fairways will be left in their natural state. "After all," says Club Secretary Terence Baines, "many golf clubs spend a fortune trying to create a wooded natural atmosphere, so we are not moving any more trees than necessary."

The overall project was started a year and a half ago with completion expected by the end of 1966, with players chasing the white ball over all 18 holes in the spring of the following year.

The work is being done by "Tee to Green Ltd.," a golf course construction firm operated by Bruce and Ralph Tucker of Kitchener.

The Tuckers are a golfing family with other brothers well known golf pros.

During construction the west branch of the Credit River will be altered to eliminate an impossible water hazard, which would have required four crossings. A much reduced water
