A Georgetown Kinsman is the new Deputy Governor of Zone A District 1 of Kinsmen Clubs.

Mischief Charge Brings \$100 Fine Acton Man

A man who sent Georgetown police on a wild goose chase drew a \$100 fine or 20 days in jail when he appeared in front of Magistrate John Ord, Georgetown, in county court Wednesday.

The 30-year-old Acton man pleaded guilty to the mischief charge.

"The police have a job to do and it is only complicated by stupid actions such as yours," Magistrate Ord told the man.

Georgetown P.C. William Koelsag was called to a Georgetown restaurant to investigate a report that a man had been badly beaten up.

He saw the accused who alleged that a man struck him with a tire iron. He was alleged to have told police that a man would be found lying in a ditch alongside the road.

An hour's search proved fruitless and he was taken to hospital for treatment.

"He had been drinking and it looked as if he had been in a fight," said P.C. Koelsag.

He added: "Apparently there had been a tussle in Norval and the accused had been involved there."

The Acton father told the Magistrate he had seen a car with blood on the front seat. "It wasn't mine," he added.

In imposing the fine Magistrate Ord said "this is a serious offense and I am only imposing the fine that I am because I'm afraid your family may suffer."

Rabies Declining in Halton, Says M.O.H.

Fewer cases of rabid animals are now reported in the county, Dr. Archie Bull, Halton County Medical officer of Health said yesterday.

The occurrence of rabies in animals has been on the decline for about the last month, Dr. Bull said.

He said the peak in Halton was reached around the beginning of the year when the county health unit was receiving about two cases a week.

Dr. Bull noted that there have been fewer people treated this year also. Increased publicity to the dangers of the disease made people more wary of contact with animals.

Five accidents on Georgetown's outskirts kept the North Halton detachment OPP busy in this corner of their territory during the past six days.

One resulted in personal injury. William Harten, Cooksville, suffered facial cuts when his car left the 7th Line of Esquevasing and hit a ditch just south of No. 17 sideroad. Damage to his car totalled \$400 according to OPP Cst. Hodgson.

The same party was involved in an accident earlier the same day when his car collided with one driven by Erwin Fielder, RR 1 Georgetown.

The Limehouse Club held their regular meeting before the other clubs arrived. They picked up tips on entertaining a weekend guest, and packing a suitcase.

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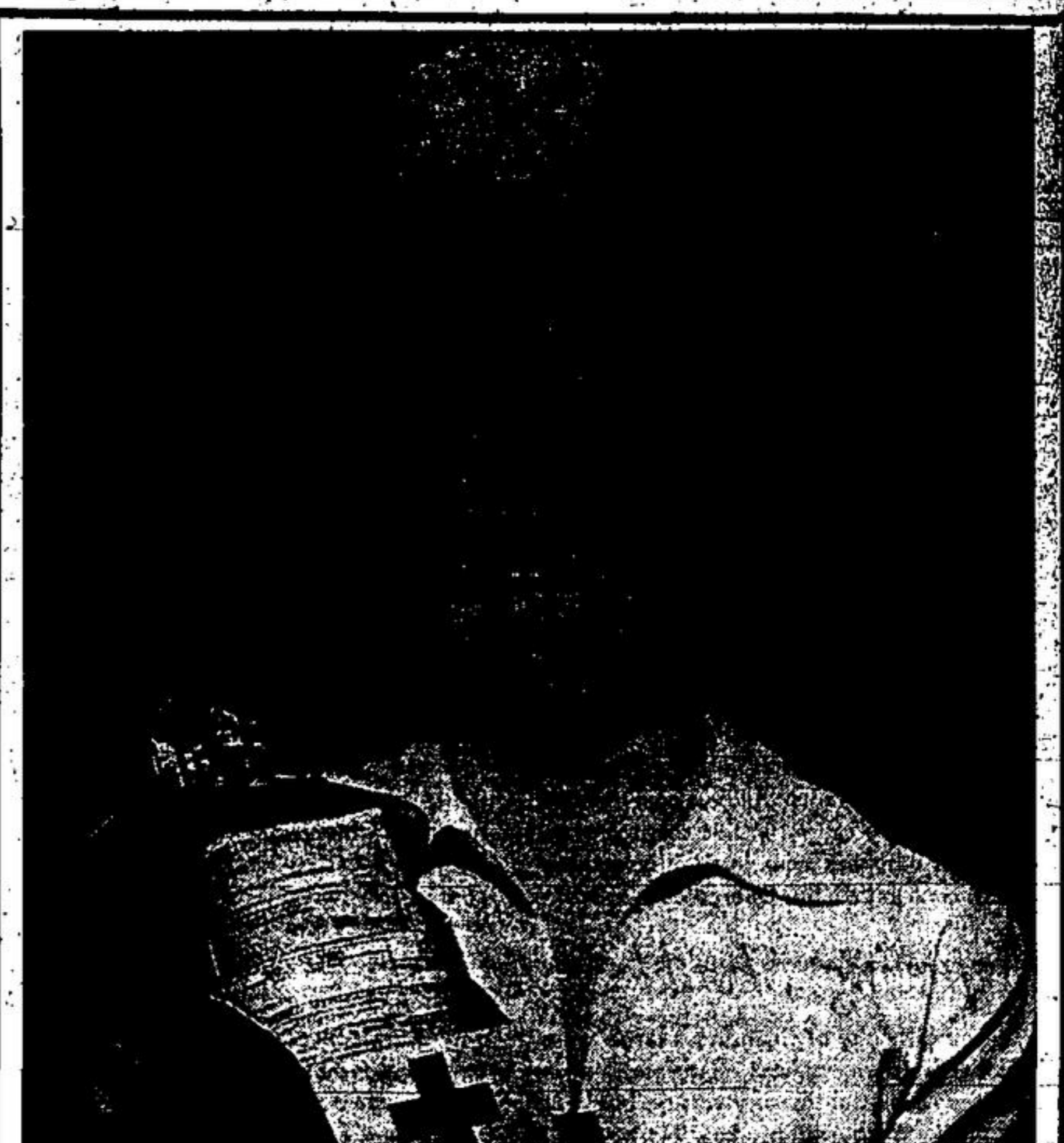
