Unitarians Collect Clothing—Distribute To World's Needy

Used clothing for distribution all over the world, by the Unitarian Service Committee, will be received at 70 Main St. S. the home of Mrs. Bruce Harding.

The Unitarian Service Committee is a non-religious, non-political group who "take from anyone willing to give, and give to anyone in need."

Following a meeting in Acton last week, where Mrs. Carl Kaufman, chairman of the Kitchener-Waterloo USC, described the poverty, hunger and misery, of a large part of the world's population, Mrs. Harding and a few other Georgetowners decided to try to something here.

The slides, shown by Mrs. Kaufman, showing whole families living and dying of exposure in large cardboard boxes, helped the viewers decide they each had enough unused clothing hanging in their cupboards to prevent at least one death by freezing, or the loss of fingers and toes, by the same bitter cold.

Mrs. Kaufman, named "Woman of the Year," by the Kitchener-Waterloo Quotarians, winners of the K-W Sertoma Club, "Service to Mankind" award, holder of a special citation, from the USC of Canada through the efforts of the well-known Dr. Lotta Hitchmanova, told of 500 babies per day being abandoned on the streets of Korea alone.

The USC takes them to orphanages sponsored by them, but managed by people of the same race as the children.

Mrs. Buckner, wife of Dr. R. Buckner of Acton, started the ball rolling there, and Mrs. Harding hopes to do the same in Georgetown.

Was Schoolhouse, Now to Be Retardate Workshop

A project that will provide work for mentally retarded adults in north Halton is expected to get under way next month.

The North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded, expects to get the project off the ground about the middle of March in what has been a one-room school house.

Harry Ishlam chairman of the association's adult training committee, states everything is set except for a supervisor.

The "Sheltered Workshop" is in need of a manager who will take charge of the retardates, teach them small tasks and supervise them as they perform them.

Mr. Ishlam states that the workshop will begin with the enrolment of three young adults — two girls and a boy.

He notes that the project is designed to care for retardates 18 years of age and over. Children over 18 are not allowed as pupils in the Sunshine School, which is operated by the association here.

"When retarded children pass the age limit, there is nothing around here for them to do but to sit at home with all their idle

M. Drury. One contract is for the supply of magnetrons and is valued at \$105,978. The other, for the supply of electron tubes, is valued at \$56,175. The contracts are among 96 unclassified defence contracts awarded by the department.
