Burned Out Engine n 100-Mile Chase

A Georgetown youth burned out the engine of his car during a 100-mile-an-hour chase on Highways 10 and 7 on Septers ber 5th Magistrate John Ord of Georgetown was told at county court Wednesday.

The accused pleaded guilty driving while impaired.

Georgetown PC William Koeslag told the court that the youth's car had reached speeds of over 100 mph on a stretch of road between Georgetown and Brampton.

He alleged that the accused was driving "quite erratically."

Magistrate Ord told the youth This is more serious than the ordinary impaired case because, while your faculties were impaired, you were driving at an extremely high speed on crowded road - which is precisely what you should not have

been doing." He fined the youth \$175 or 80 days in jail and suspended his license for six months. A second charge of dangerous driving was withdrawn by

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
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
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
