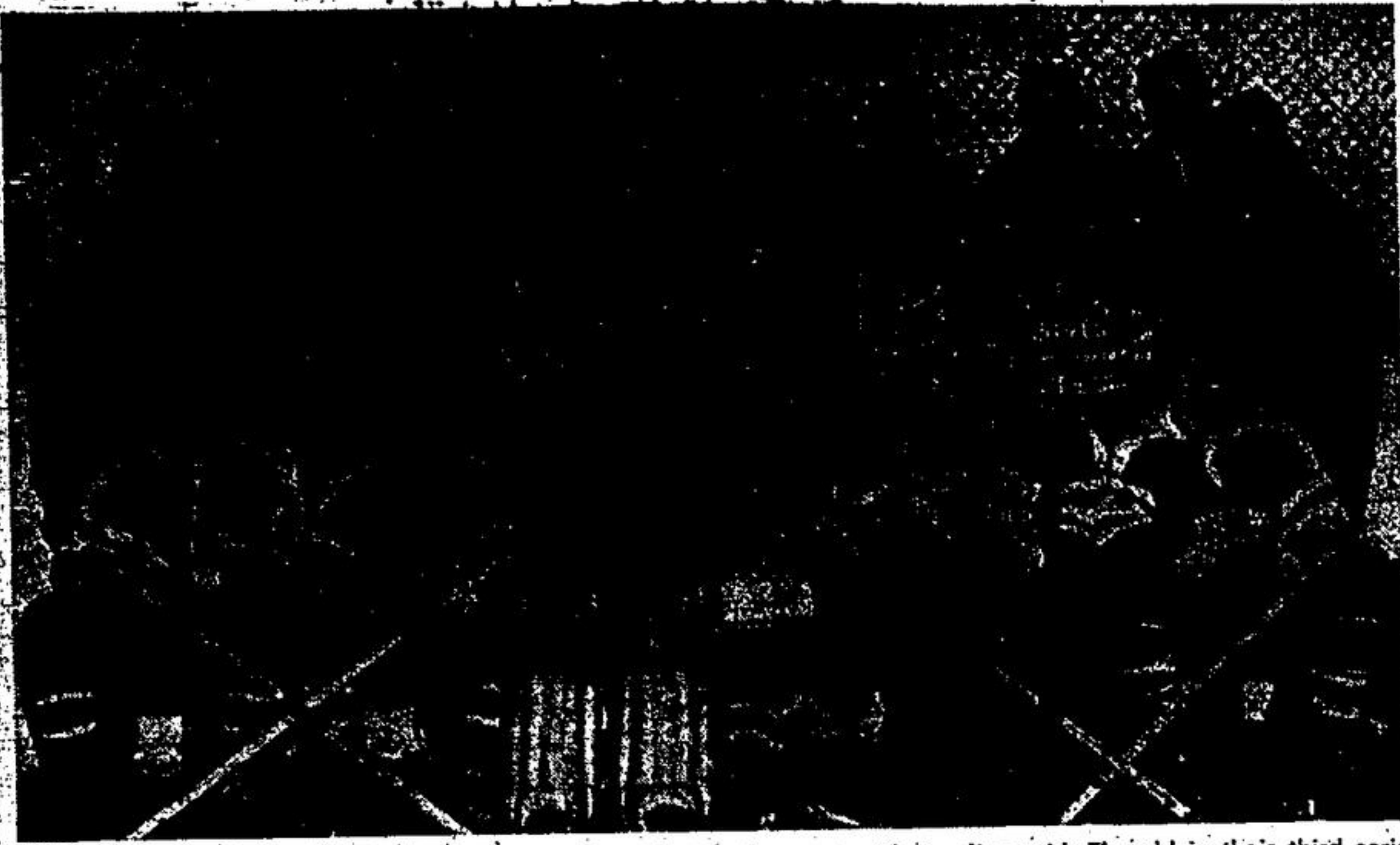


GEORGETOWN HAS TWO GOING FOR BROKE.

Robinson Poison to Hornets Raiders Wrestle Away Lead

Georgetown Raiders' puck eater, Tommy Ayres, was beaten twice in the first period, and once in the third, but got in front of everything else, launched in his direction as his mates crushed Orangeville Hornets 10-3 in the third game of their best 4 of 7 OHA Central Ontario Junior C quarter-finals in Orangeville Saturday night.

Paul Robinson was insect spray to the angry Hornets. He poked holes in their nest four times to personally defeat the hot and cold Orangeville crew with a fine individual performance.

The win gave Georgetown a 2-1 lead in games.

The first period indicated an even tussle. Georgetown owned a slim 3-2 edge after the first twenty minutes, but extended it to 6-2 in the middle period.

They gained strength as the game progressed and overwhelmed Orangeville with a 4-1 3rd period.

Dave McMenemy, up from the

Georgetown Midgets, assisted Robinson on the first of his two first period goals. Rod Presswood and Wayne Riddall setup the second. Ron Lane scored the other Georgetown goal in the first period unassisted.

Watts and White triggered Orangeville's goals.

Simon Llewellyn from Don Norton, Paul Robinson from Ron Lane and Riddall, and Mike Cummins from Bob Allen fired the unanswered volleys in the second frame.

Robinson's fourth goal made it 7-2 with less than a minute elapsed in the third period. Ron Lane ran the Georgetown count into double figures.

Orangeville pumped in the final goal of the game. Watson the sniper with Davidson helping out with less than 2 minutes to go.

One oddity of the affair was a rare penalty call. Raider defence player Rod Presswood was given a five minute major for elbowing.

Norton Leads Georgetown Juniors To First Playoff Victory

One of the members of the original Georgetown junior hockey club when it was born three years ago, Don Norton, showed the way as Georgetown Raiders downed Orangeville Hornets 6-4 in Orangeville Thursday March 3 to even their best of 7 OHA Central Junior C League at a game apiece.

Norton scored three times and assisted on a fourth in spearheading the Raider attack.

Georgetown took a 1-0 first period lead and built it up to 4-0 before Hornets swarmed back with a 3-goal eruption that set the stage for an interesting final period.

Raiders scored very early and very late in the third stanza, sandwiching Orangeville's goal to capture the key game.

Norton's pass to Ron Lane was relayed to Paul Robinson for Raider's first at 6:10.

Norton upped it to 2-0 from Terry Lane and Bob Allen at 5:49 of the middle period and then repeated with Georgetown's third goal at 8:33 from Rod Presswood and Russ Hartley. Presswood relayed Ron Lane's pass to Paul Robinson for his second goal and Georgetown's fifth at 11:05.

Orangeville came to life two minutes later when Davidson whisked Watt's pass into the Raider twine to break the bubble. Workman responded at 16:22 with Hornets second sting. Pritt assisting, and with 8 seconds left in the period, Workman again scored unassisted to make it 4-3.

Norton's solo rush at 1:52 of the final period recaptured the 2-goal margin but Orangeville

pulled close again at 12:11 when McMullen scored from Watts. Doug Selby popped the insurance marker into an empty net as Hornets pressed to get even with 5 seconds left.

MILFORD NAMED GAME WARDEN

A game warden for Esqueusing Township and adjoining territories has been appointed by the Ontario Department of Lands & Forests.

J.H. Milford of Oakville will handle the job of policing Esqueusing, Nassagaweya, Puslinch townships and Oakville and Burlington.

E.E. Ted Ackert of Moffat, local game warden for the past two years, has been transferred to work from the Owen Sound office.

The announcement of the change was made this week by the Department of Lands & Forests.

The appointment was effective Feb. 1. Milford was appointed after graduating from the Ontario Forest Technical College, formerly known as the Ontario Forest Rangers School in Toronto.

He received a Forestry Technician's Degree on completing the three-year course.

Game wardens are also referred to as conservation officers. The job includes stocking rivers and streams in the area that are suitable for fishing.

"We work on the 'put and take' system in that we scatter the 5,000 speckled trout used

to stock these streams in places where we think fishermen are likely to 'gather,' said Mr. Milford.

He said he is in charge of protecting game in the area, noting that all game animals are now out of season and he is constantly patrolling to make sure there is no hunting of protected animals.

In 1965 alone, 12 deer were reported killed by cars in Halton while 16 were killed in Puslinch township.

Puslinch is far less built-up than Halton and has more deer, he said, but added that Halton county has a very high population of deer considering how settled it is.

NIMRODS EYEING APRIL 30

The Department of Lands and Forests last week announced the dates for angling seasons. Halton's trout season will officially open on Saturday, April 30, and last until September 15.

The season is for brook, brown, aurora and rainbow trout.
