"No Interest" Burlington Cancels Out Fire Bureau

At its March meeting, the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau accepted with regret a letter of withdrawal from the Bureau, from the Burlington Fire Department Chief Reg. Law. "Our membership is terminated due to a complete lack of interest on the part of our members," he wrote. The Bureau was founded in 1957 with firefighters from Burlington, Milton, Acton and Georgetown participating on a voluntary basis, and has carried out fire prevention programs on a county-wide basis for the past 10 years. Members of the other four fire departments agreed the Bureau would carry on in the four municipalities and retain the "Halton" name, despite Burlington's withdrawal.

Members set up a Spring Clean-up campaign and decided to have 10,000 clean-up posters printed, urging residents to stage an April clean-up and check for fire hazards in their home. Theme of the posters is "Carelessness Costs Dollars."

A budget totalling \$1,650 was approved for 1968. The major portion of the budget is allocated for literature for the Bureau's poster campaign, Spring Clean-Up and Fire Prevention Week.

Allot \$117,000 Highway Expenditures on No. 7

The Ontario Department of Highways has set an allotment of \$117,000 for construction and maintenance on No. 7 Highway through Georgetown for the fiscal year 1968-67. It was revealed in a release from that department this week.

The allotments set are the Departments estimates of the reasonable requirements of the municipalities for the normal construction and maintenance.

Georgetown's total allotment is made up of \$37,000 for construction, and \$80,000 for maintenance.

Esqueung Township was given exactly the same total allotment made up of \$32,000 for construction and \$85,000 for maintenance.

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Another addition to the department will be a second telephone line. The department had been hampered by not being able to place outgoing calls when the office phone is in use, and this will help to overcome this.

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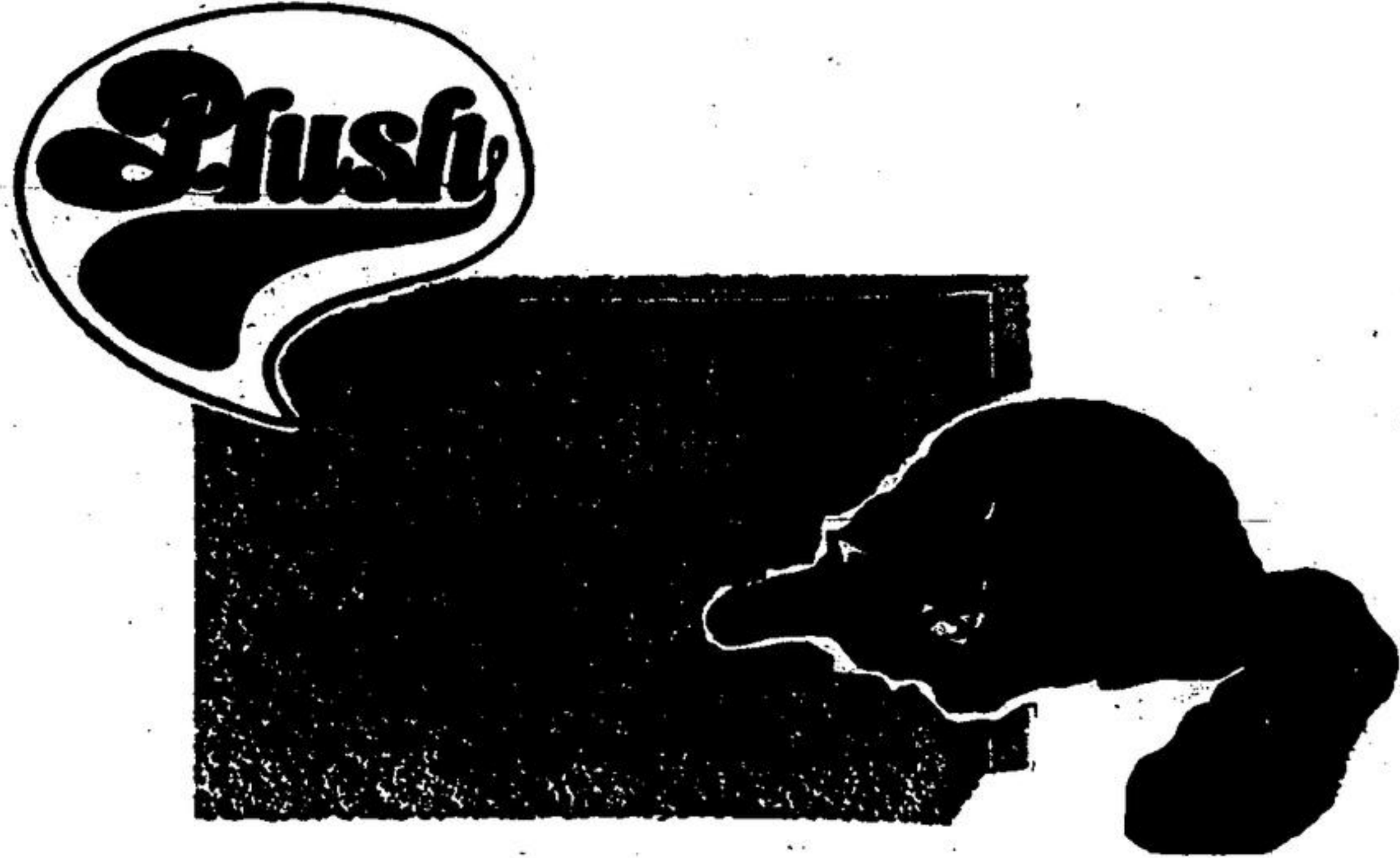
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
