**Improve Own Diction is Advice to P.S. Teachers**

"If teachers are to improve the diction of their pupils they must first improve their own speech," Mrs. Helen Duffy a North York speech therapist told seventy-five Georgetown and Esqueusing women in Knox Church Hall Thursday March 3.

Mrs. Duffy, guest speaker, at the third quarterly meeting of the local branch of the Federation of Women Teachers' Association of Ontario, addressed the group on "speech correction in the classroom."

"Teachers must open their mouths and say what they have to say. Teachers must remember they set the example and the children follow," she stated.

Mrs. Duffy explained a number of common faults and advised the teachers on ways to correct their own speech flaws and those of the pupils.

Mrs. Duffy was introduced by Mrs. Vera Macdonald and thanked by Miss Gayle Hanna. Miss Hanna presented a gift to the guest speaker on behalf of the teachers.

Other guests at the dinner meeting were nine Georgetown

**Keep Eye on Possibility Of Glen Credit Flood**

Esqueusing Twp. councillors have been alerted to possible flooding in Glen Williams R.R. Parker, chairman of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority's flood committee stated on the weekend.

Mr. Parker added that the Conservation Authority has placed eight men at strategic points to watch the level of the Credit River.

He stated that the river was jammed with ice in the Glen area—a condition that could lead to flooding.

"If it rains much there still could be trouble," Mr. Parker said during a meeting of the Halton County Emergency Measures Organization.

Despite a weekend rain, Glen Williams residents stated there is little danger of flooding.

Two jams were reported. One blocked the river near the home of E.W. Green, who experienced flooding three weeks ago by the

same jam. W. Bruce McGregor, co-ordinator of Halton County EMO, estimated that nearly two feet of water covered the lower part of Mr. Green's back yard.

Credit Valley Conservation Authority field officer Stan White said a jam below the new Glen bridge is a potential trouble spot.

He said that recent cool weather has kept the run off to a safe level. A rise in temperature combined with a steady rain would present a flood threat, however.

On Sunday the Credit through Glen Williams was well above its normal level, but still well off the flood level.

Two changes in the river's course through the Glen were made last year.

**LET'S PLAY BRIDGE**

Bridge experts claim that there is a squeeze situation occurs in one hand out of every five. If this is true, then players around the Acton Bridge Club miss a lot of squeeze plays. Two declarers found this squeeze last week. It was one of the more obvious squeeze situations and it occurred on a hand at the Acton Bridge Club. This is a simple squeeze against one opponent. One opponent must guard two suits but is forced to discard one of the suits. Here is the hand.

Board No. 7.  
Dealer — East.  
Both sides vulnerable.

North  
S-Q J 9 4  
H-Q 8 7  
D-10 9 5  
C-A 9 2

West East

H-9 6 5 4 H-J 10 2

The bidding:

East South West North  
Pass 1 C Pass 1 S  
Pass 3 NT All Pass

South is too strong to open one no trump and too weak to open two no trump, hence he temporizes by bidding one club. As soon as North replies, showing at least six points, South jumps to three no trump.

I realize that there is no problem in making three no trump, but see if you can do as well as the two declarers did last week. The opening lead is the spade five. How many tricks can you take?

Even without seeing the East-West hand, two declarers made 12 tricks. A low spade is played to the first trick and East's king is won with the ace. Since a club must be lost in any event, a low club is led and passed to East. East returns a diamond, which is won by declarer. A low spade to the queen reveals the distribution in that suit.

Declarer re-enters his hand with a heart, in order to take the marked spade finesse.

East is under pressure to discard and can temporarily discard hearts. Declarer must discard a diamond on dummy's last spade. Now the hands look like this.

Two hearts lead finish the job. East can discard a diamond, but then he has no good choice. If East discards a second diamond, declarer leads the diamond ace and sets up dummy's 10. If East discards a club, then the ace and king of clubs will set up declarer's seven.

This hand is a good example of the simple squeeze. See if you can spot one in your next session at the bridge table.

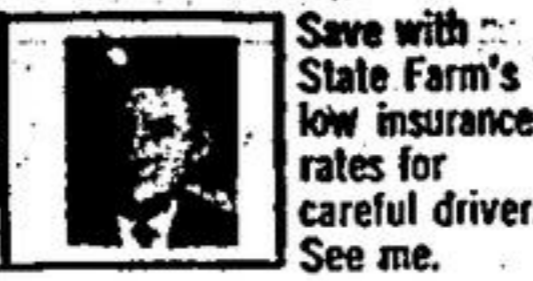
