

1400 FANS JAM MEMORIAL ARENA SEE RAIDERS EDGE ARCH RIVALS

Second Semi-Final Meeting On Merchant Ice Tomorrow Raider Machine Operating Without Two Spark Plugs

A easily-bouncing backhand shot by Georgetown Raider Bob Allen that fooled Milton Merchant defenseman Frank Marabioro, enabled Raiders to be first out of the starting gate Sunday in the semi-final series that is destined to set some attendance records at arenas in Georgetown and Milton.

Fourteen hundred partisans watched Allen's shot elude Marabioro's right pad and trickle into the Merchant cage taking with it Milton's chances for an important initial game victory.

The tie-breaker came with a little more than four minutes to play in a third period that saw Georgetown wipe out a Merchant lead a minute earlier. Raiders' spectacular rearguard Russ Hartley squared things with his goal from the corner of Marabioro's, but after he had dug the puck out from behind the net.

Milton mentor Murray Green pulled his masked marvel for an extra scoring threat in the dying seconds, but even when Milton snipers got their shots on target Tommy Ayres was always in the right spot to field the rubber.

For impossible steps it was possibly Ayres' best home game of the season.

The game was deadlocked 1-1 at the end of the first period, and Merchants owned a 3-2 advantage after two frames.

Raiders' high points man, Ron Lane, converted brother Terry's pass into the opening goal at 3:17 of the first period. Georgetown failed to cash in on a number of chances to build a lead in this frame, their best of the three, and finally bury Merchant Joe Hore

evoned things with just seconds left.

He tied two Raider checkers in knots with a determined bit of puck control and then beat Ayres cleanly from close range.

A partially screened shot by Terry Hay gave Georgetown their lead back within five minutes. Rod Presswood and Bob Allen assisting, but penalties enabled Milton to scramble back.

Georgetown was playing four men to six when Craig Brush scored from a traffic jam on Ayres' doorstep, Stickle and Bill Currie collecting the assists.

Milton's only lead was engineered with four minutes left in the period when Hearn whipped Gervais' pass into the Raider goal.

Referees Bill Divorski and Sandy Proctor assessed 29 penalties, 17 to Merchants, and 12 to Raiders including a 2 minute bench sentence.

The two traditional hockey foes collide again tomorrow night (Friday) in Milton. A Raider win then could make Sunday's game here the possible windup. Should the best of five series go the limit the teams will play number four back in Milton, the following Friday and the fifth here the following Sunday.

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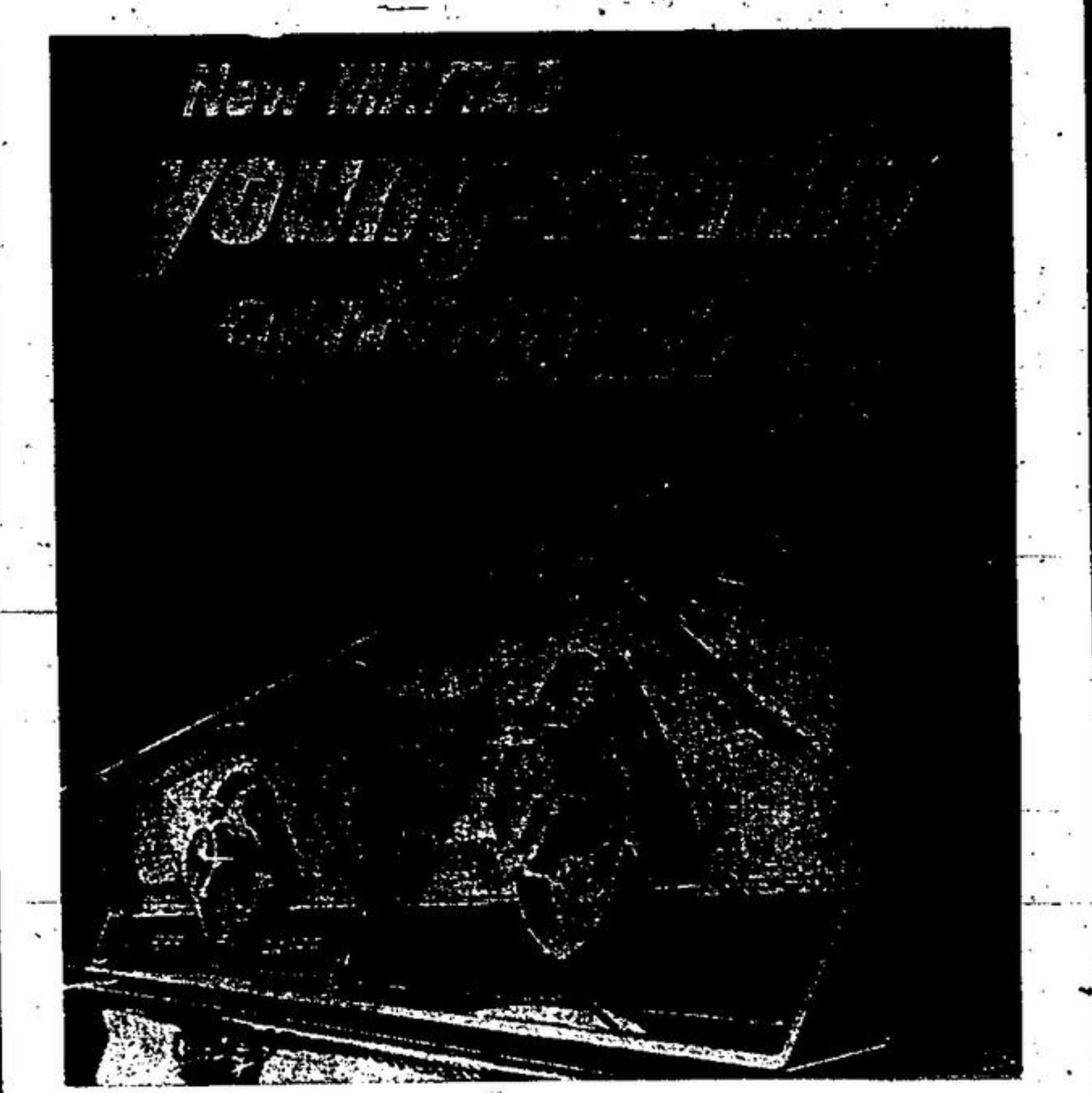
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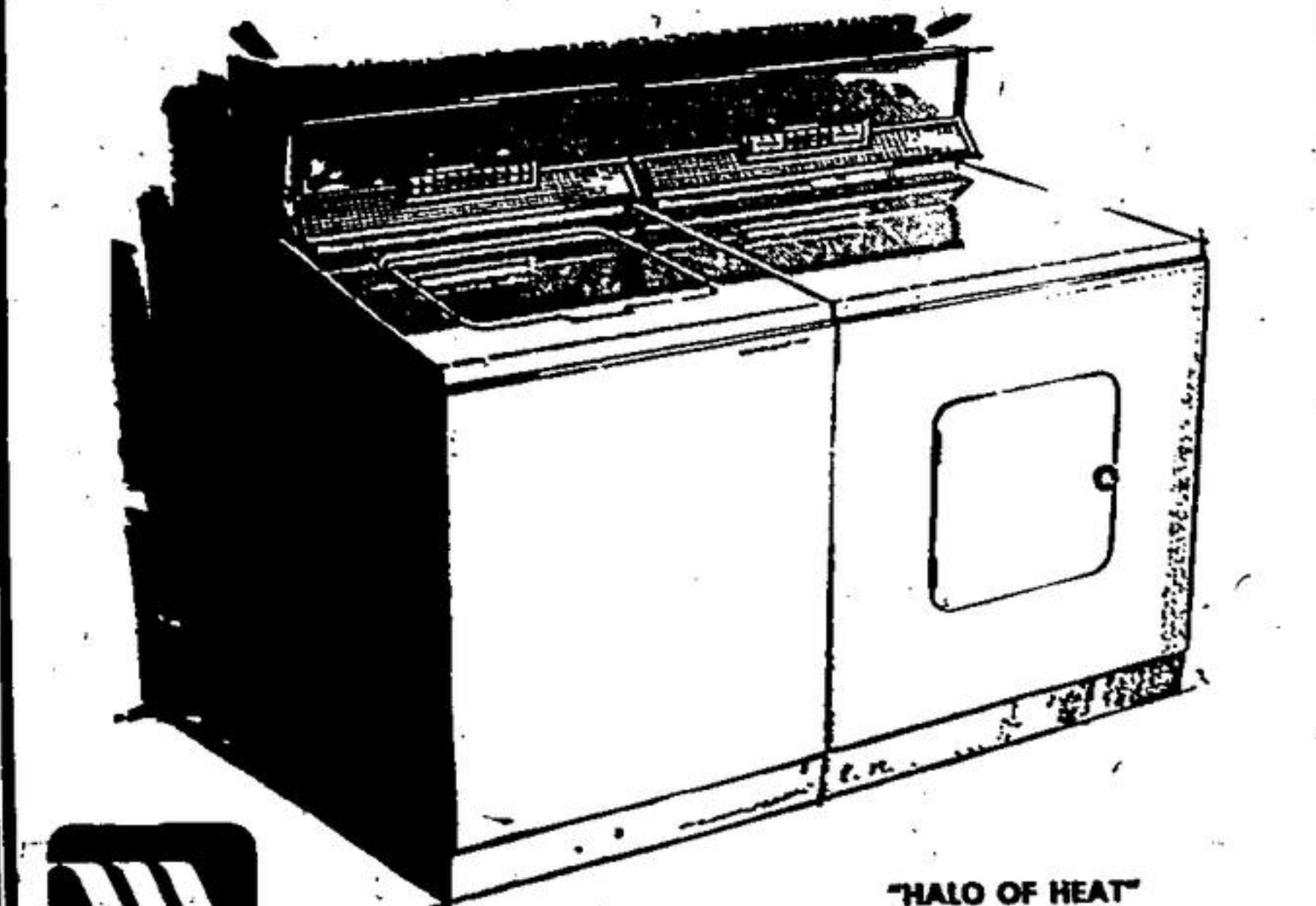
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
