> West led the diamond six which I won. I now cashed the ace of hearts, the ace of diamonds, and led the diamond queen. All we had to do was take two spade tricks to defeat the contract.

Declarer ruffed the third trumps. He cashed the ace of clubs and ruffed a club in dummy. He now led a heart. Not wishing to be overruffed, I discarded the club king while declarer ruffed low. Declarer led a club and ruffed in dummy with the king of spades. I overruffed and led a diamond. Unfortunately dummy's nine of spades was bigger than West's eight and the lead was in dummy. Declarer finessed the spades and claimed the balance. Even if West does not ruff the diamond with the spade five and lead the nine to smother West's

I had the feeling that somehow I had not defended too well. Can you find the error? If I let declarer ruff the third club with the spade king and I do not overruff, we must make 2 spades. If declarer leads trump, East can go up with the ace and exit with a diamond. If this is ruffed in dummy there are no spades left for a finesse. 



