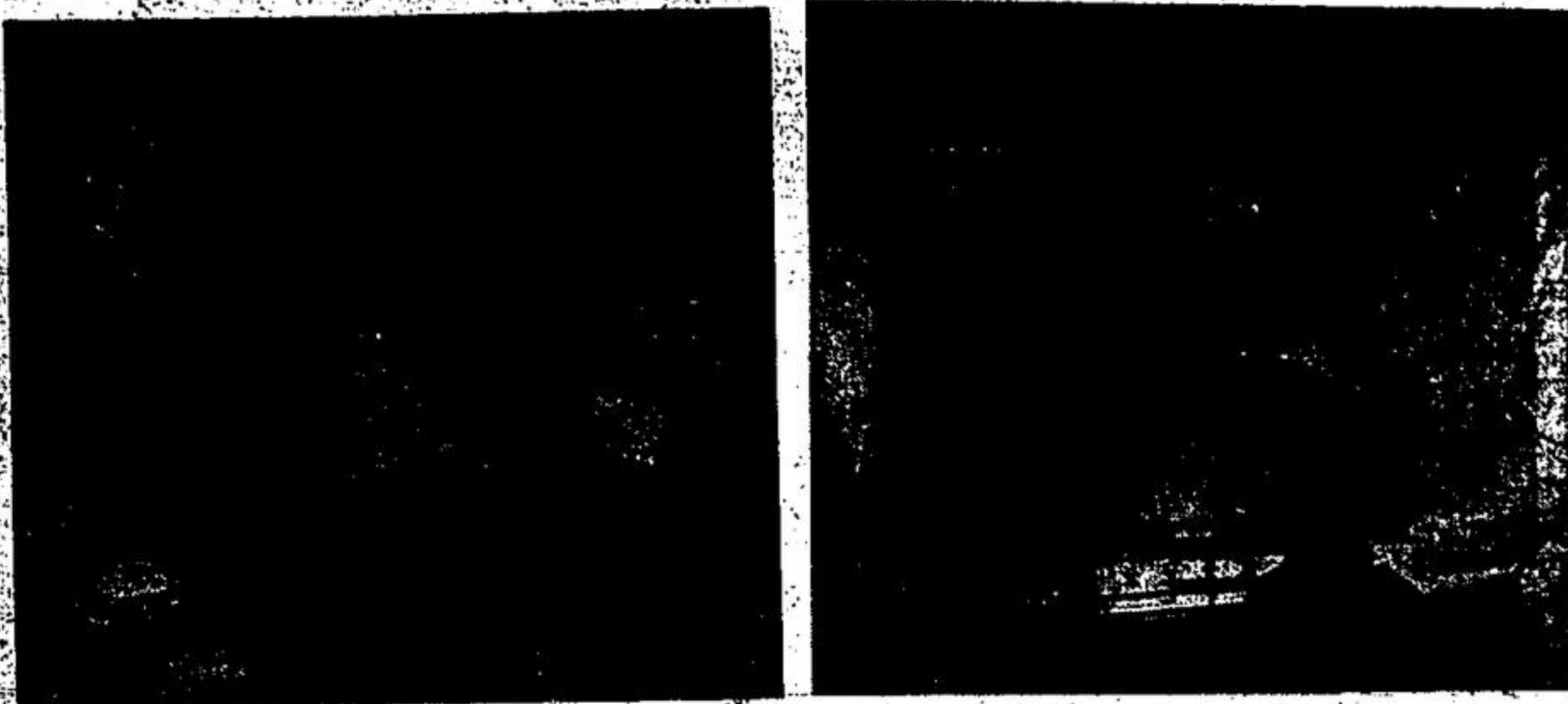
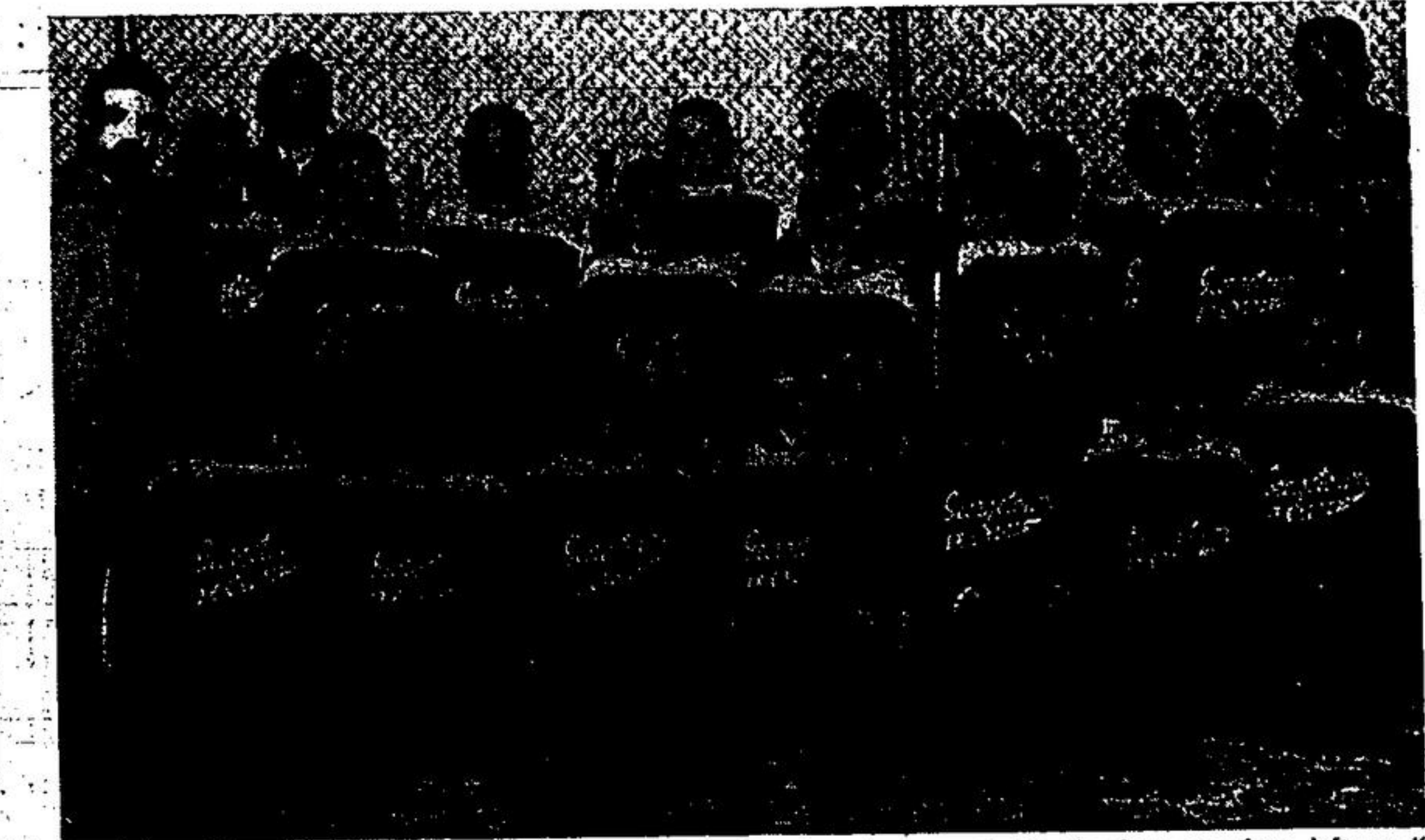


## American League All-Stars Earned Piece of Winners' Circle

## Richmond Squashes Move To Erase Youngest Baseball Teams

The president of the Georgetown Baseball Association and Halton County Baseball Association, Bill Richmond, chalked up two wins and no losses at the Ontario Baseball Association convention in Midland on the weekend.

Richmond verbally cut to pieces a motion by Toronto delegate William Smith which would wipe out all OBA organized ball for youngsters under the age 10 and the motion was defeated 66-0. Even the mover, was swayed to vote against his own suggestion. The delegates added a standing ovation.

Richmond later tabled a motion that cleaned up a matter that's been a sore point with the OBA for years. His motion to compel all baseball teams which play Sun. games during their regular schedule to play on Sunday in the playoffs if ordered to by the OBA also carried 66-0.

In the past, teams with shallow pitching staffs have claimed during playoffs that they can play only Saturday games.

Most of the time this has resulted in one game per week enabling their best hurler to rest up and pitch every game.

Items of business out of the Friday-Saturday convention which will directly concern Halton Baseball included a hike of \$25 in the entry fee, bringing it to \$75, and change in team classification limits. Under the new classifications, communities with a population of 999 or under are D Class, 1000 to 2999 C Class, 3000 to 7999 B Class, 8000 to 24 999 A Class, and over 25,000 A Major or Sr.

The revision which tickled

the fancy of Georgetown Juveniles was one which changed the eligibility date from May 1 to Jan. 1. It means the difference between losing and keeping their two big sluggers Wayne Davison and Danny Arbie. Davison's birthday is Jan. 17 and Arbie's February 13. The juveniles finished first in their league last year.

Also at the convention from the Halton Baseball Association

were Len Andrews of Campbellville, Al Bayton of Waterdown, Al Burrows of Oakville and Reg Locke of Burlington.

Harold Marshall and Robert Lane of Georgetown also attended.

Guests at the Saturday dinner were greeted by a well known former local man Rev. Leonard Self, now Reeve of Midland.

Nearly three thousand Rotarians from 51 clubs in District 707 heard William Davis, Ontario Minister of Education, Donald S. MacDonald, parliamentary secretary to the minister of external affairs and Dr. Gordon Bell, authority on addiction, who were among the chief speakers.

Initial plans were made for a community-wide campaign for funds for the Bible Society to be held early in May.

Walford, one of the original entries who have returned annually, will be among the missing. They've scheduled a game in Mexico City Easter Week.

Volunteer help is still being sought. Names of willing workers are being listed by tournament chairman Red Asseltine.

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Prizes were presented by Mr. John Mintern and Mr. Bob Costic.

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## Sell, Option Acreage Ferro Steel Addition

Delayed a week when council's closing deadline interfered with completion of a by-law vote last week, Ferro Steel secured a 3 1/2 acre lot adjoining its factory Monday. The firm will pay the town \$1,000 an acre and plans a building extension this year.

Also included in the deal is an option until the year-end on an extra 3-acre lot, which would entail further building plans if the option is not taken. If the option is not taken up, the firm has "first right of refusal" if another buyer indicates interest in the land.

While no councillor voted against the sale, there was some concern about the land coverage of the proposed factory addition.

Cr. Roy Ballentine said the town might only benefit by \$1,000 in taxes from the acreage it is selling.

Deputy Reeve Young contracted a planned 35,000 square ft. space by another local firm which recently bought land with the 6,000 square ft. which Ferro plans.

"I'm not disputing this sale which has been underway since last fall," said Mayor Gibbons

"but we should take a firm stand in future on selling serviced land for \$1,000 an acre." Cr. Ern Hyde, who is council's industrial chairman, explained that council has two problems, ensuring that the maximum tax money accrues from land which the town is selling, while also cooperating with industry.

Ferro is a local firm and the town wants to help in any expansion plans, he said. The firm has accepted the town's terms for land coverage, and it is impossible to comply with coverage asked of some other industries because of the nature of their business.

## Palermo Girl Is Best County Public Speaker

Georgetown was represented by three contestants in the Halton County Public Speaking finals in Oakville Friday. Local inspectorate winners Farley Helfant of Howard Wrigglesworth school, runner-up Pamela Norton, Glen Williams, and Georgetown Holy Cross school winner Marina Kent were among the nine contestants.

The final was won by Donna Gowland of Palermo Public school.

## Police College For P.C. Liberty

Another Georgetown policeman will attend a training course at the Ontario Police College at Aylmer.

Cst. Harry Liberty has been named by council to attend the college this fall. Cst. Dan Mart attended the same course last year.
