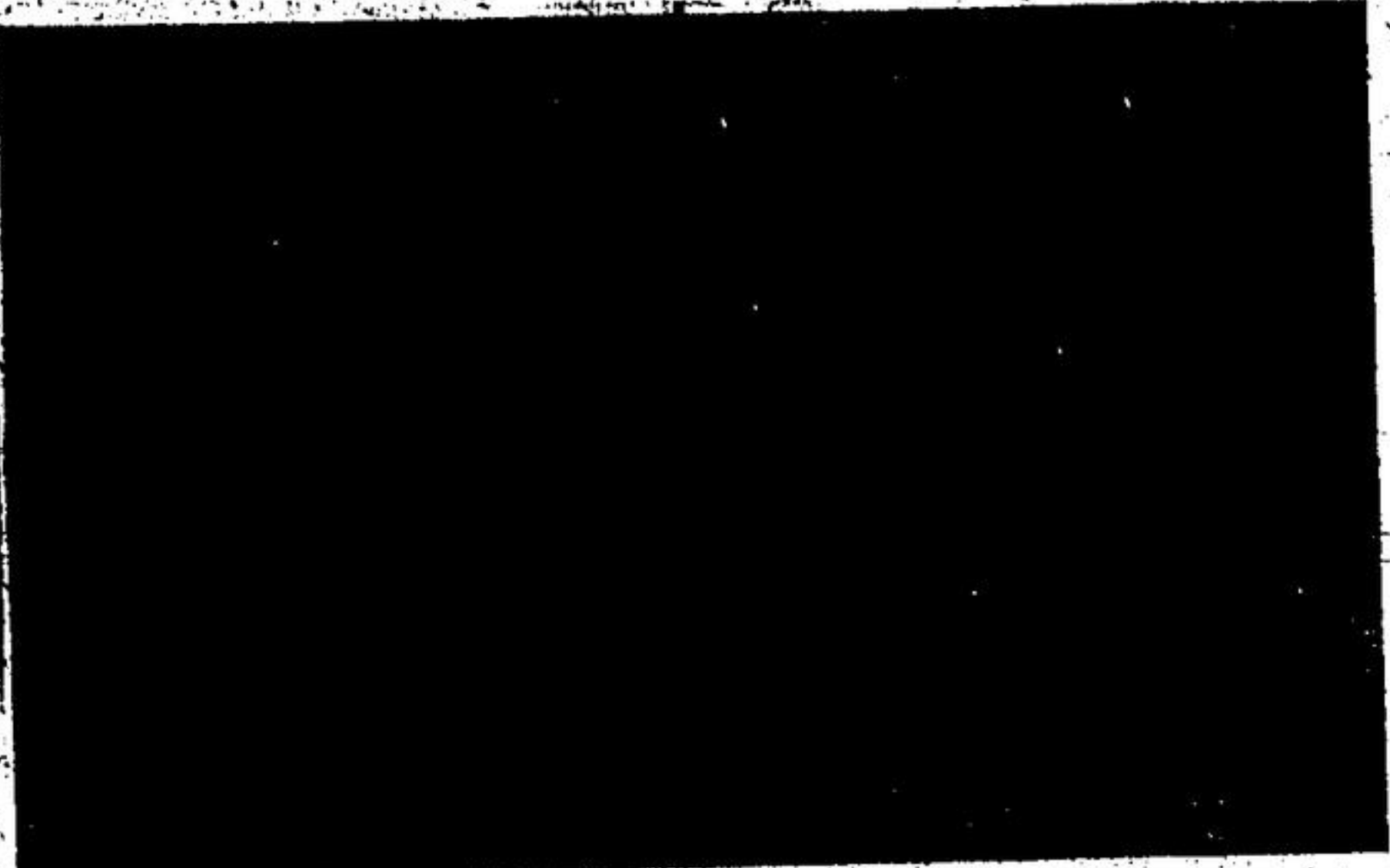


# FOCUS ON CONSTRUCTION



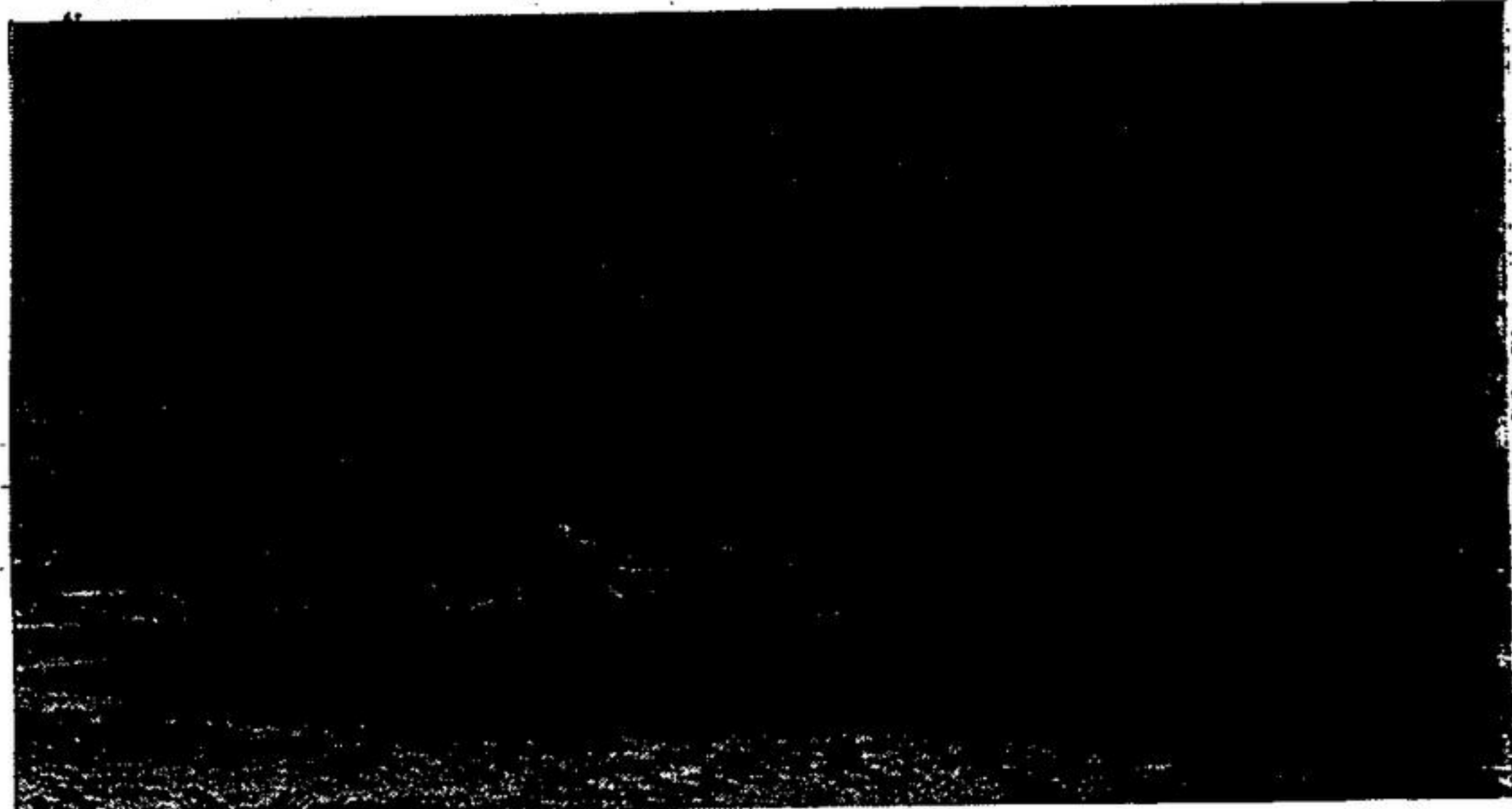
## Break in Weather Is Green Light To Work Crews

Construction work at a number of building sites is proceeding at a faster rate now that winter has let up. Work on Georgetown's sixth public school (top left) has been going on through the winter and the block and brick exterior walls are up. The school is being built by McNally Construction and will be ready for occupancy in September. The seven room structure is going up between Harrison and George Kennedy public schools, in the Mountainview Road - Sargent Road area.



An elevated water tower will grow out of this muddy site (left center) in Georgetown's industrial park, where Horton Steel workers started the initial stages this week. The tower will provide storage for 500,000 gallons.

Another new piece of the industrial park skyline is this large plant being constructed by Economy Forms. The 130 x 340 ft. plant will house the first Canadian division of the Des Moines, Iowa, based firm. It will supply steel forms for the concrete industry. The building is located on an eleven and a half acre site.



## Work Grows, Children's Aid Plans Second Office in County

Halton County Children's Aid admitted 82 children into its care and placed 62 in adoption it was revealed at the annual meeting of the organization on Thursday night. The meeting was held in Halton Centennial Manor.

Fifteen children were returned to their parents and adoptions were completed for 92. The Society began last year with 102 children.

The Society helped 168 unmarried mothers in that time, completed 65 divorce reports, helped 791 children in their own homes through service to 250 families and gave 541 other miscellaneous services.

At the end of the year it had 107 children in its care. In 1965 the Society overspent on its income by \$12,988. Income was \$176,668 and expenditure was \$189,652.

The Children's Aid plans to expand its scope with the establishment of a staffed sub-office in the southern part of the county. It was disclosed by G. K. Askwith, executive director.

Mr. Askwith told the large crowd that the growth of the communities in the county has increased requests for social services.

Mr. Askwith added: "because we are an established social agency serving the whole of Halton county it is natural and right that we take an increasing responsibility for the provision of effective and co-ordinated services."

He said the main concern was that the service to families and children should be a professional one — not fragmented or split between communities. It should be available and consistent throughout the whole county.

Mr. Askwith said: "It is in this direction that we plan to move in the months ahead. We shall look forward to an increasing cooperation with other community organizations and agencies in order to effect our plans."

He said he could envisage the time when the Society included in its name the words "Family Service."

## Cars Hit On Steep John Street Hill

Cars driven by Arthur Hoekstra, 87 Mountainview Rd. N., and Frederick Hiltz, 7 Emery Street, collided on the John St. East hill Sunday afternoon.

The investigating officer P.C. Harry Liberty of the Georgetown Police Department said Hoekstra was proceeding east down the steep hill and Hiltz was westbound.

The damage estimate was \$300 to the 1961 Chevrolet driven by Hiltz and \$200 to Hoekstra's 1964 Ford.

Damage amounted to \$275 when cars came together at the corner of Main St. and Victoria Avenue near the Main St. railway bridge at midnight Saturday.

Police said a 1966 Volkswagen driven by Donald McKeown, Alliston, was eastbound on Main and making a left turn onto Victoria when it was in collision with the westbound car driven by Harold Sheppard, 68 Main St. N.

P.C. Dan Martin handled the investigation.

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## Opposes European Jaunt Young Says "Joy Ride"

James Young, Georgetown's deputy reeve has strongly opposed the three-week tour of Europe to be taken later this year by three Halton County Council representatives.

At a special meeting Friday to select the men to represent the County Council Deputy Reeve Young, who was absent when the council agreed to send the representatives on the jaunt, said: "I would have opposed the motion at that time, had I been here. I think it's a flagrant waste of money."

He claimed that the trip was nothing more than a "joy ride" for members of council. He said the members would not learn anything that could not be found out in Canada.

"I don't think it wise for members to go to England for answers that we have in this country," Mr. Young stated.

Authorized to go were: H. H. Hinton, the county warden and Reeve of Acton, Frank Rogers, Deputy Reeve of Burlington, and county clerk-administrator Garfield Brown.

The decision to send Hinton, Rogers and Brown was carried on a recorded vote, 20 to 9.

Opposed were Mr. Young, Allan Day, Deputy-Reeve of Oakville and George Leslie, reeve of Esqueping Twp., William Healy, deputy reeve of Nassagaweya, and Charles Menzies, deputy reeve of Milton.

Georgetown's reeve William Hunter who opposed the trip

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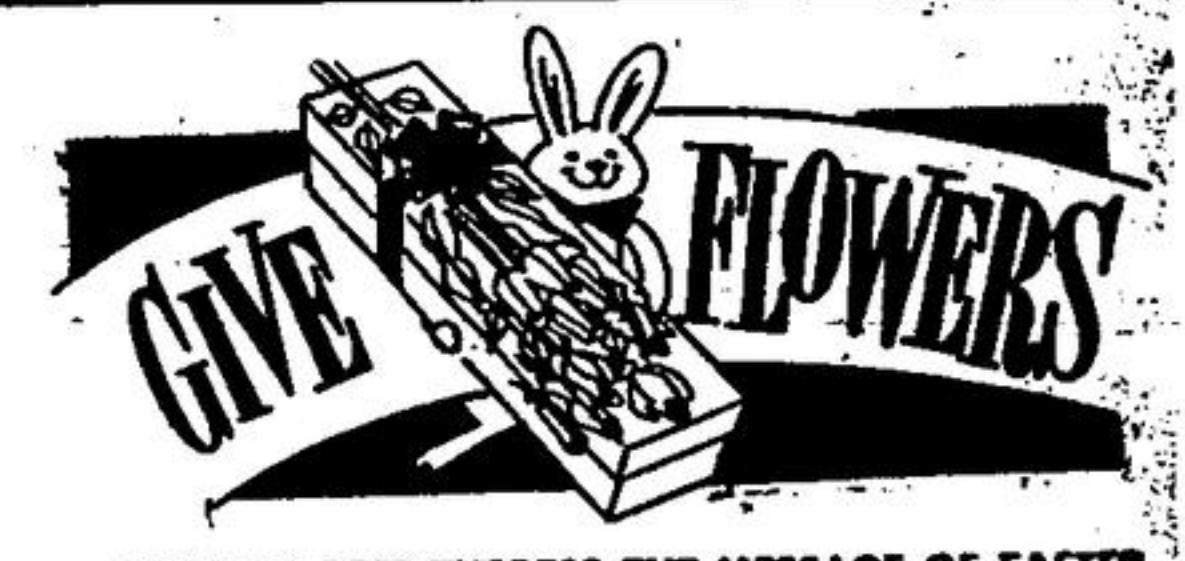
