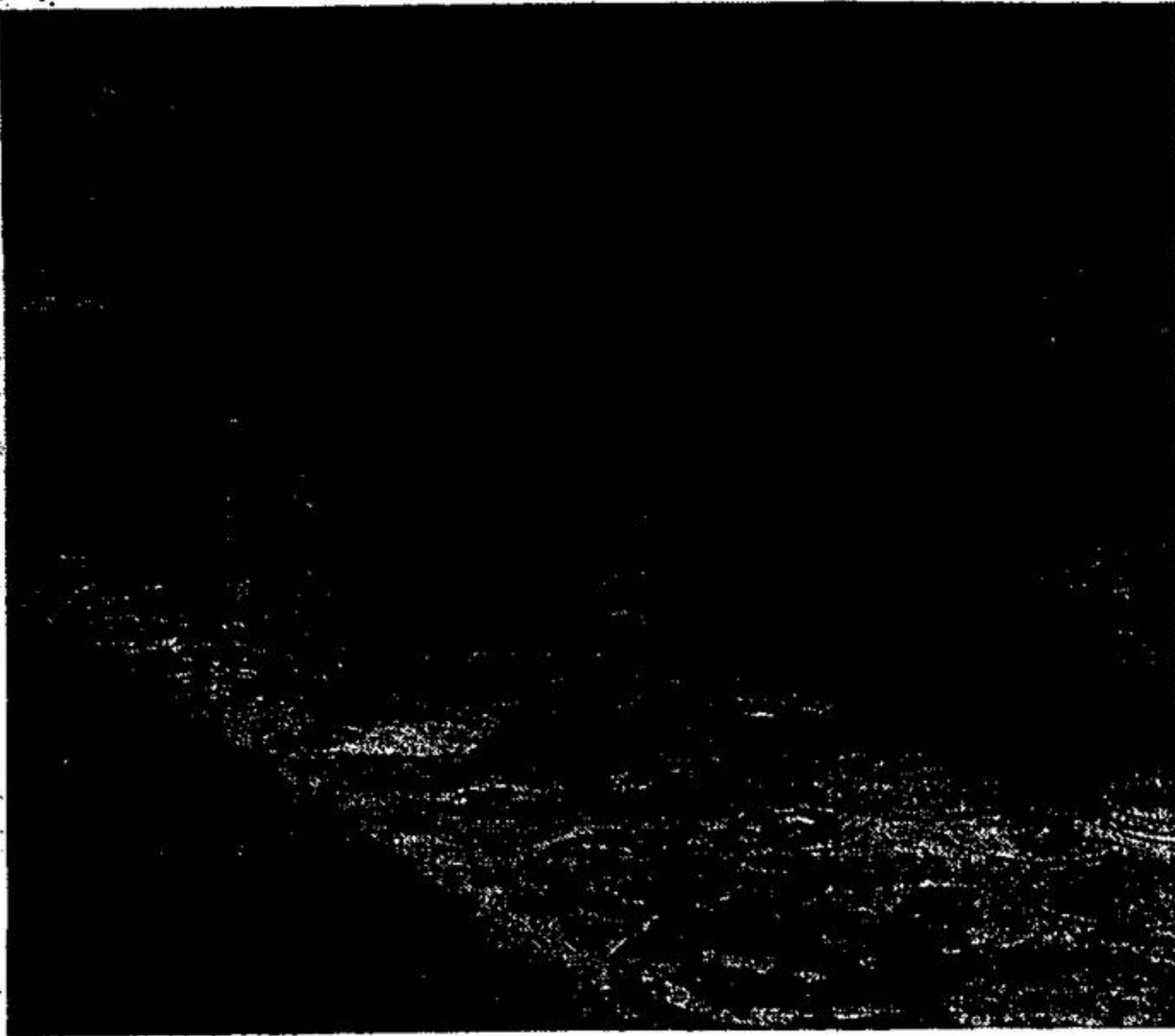


**B & P GAMES NIGHT**

**Planting Calendar**

**PLANTING CALENDAR** Most flowers and vegetables fall into three main planting groups. Technically these are known and usually listed in the seed catalogues as hardy, semi-hardy and tender. In the first planting groups are such things as sweet peas, cosmos, alyssum, poppy and a host of others. These won't mind a bit of frost, especially while in the early stages of germination and growth, and they actually prefer to get started in the cool weather. Among the vegetables in this group are peas, lettuce, spinach and onion sets.

Council appointed Frank Morette general foreman of the town works forces at their Council meeting Monday night. Alfred Collins will be retained as a consultant.

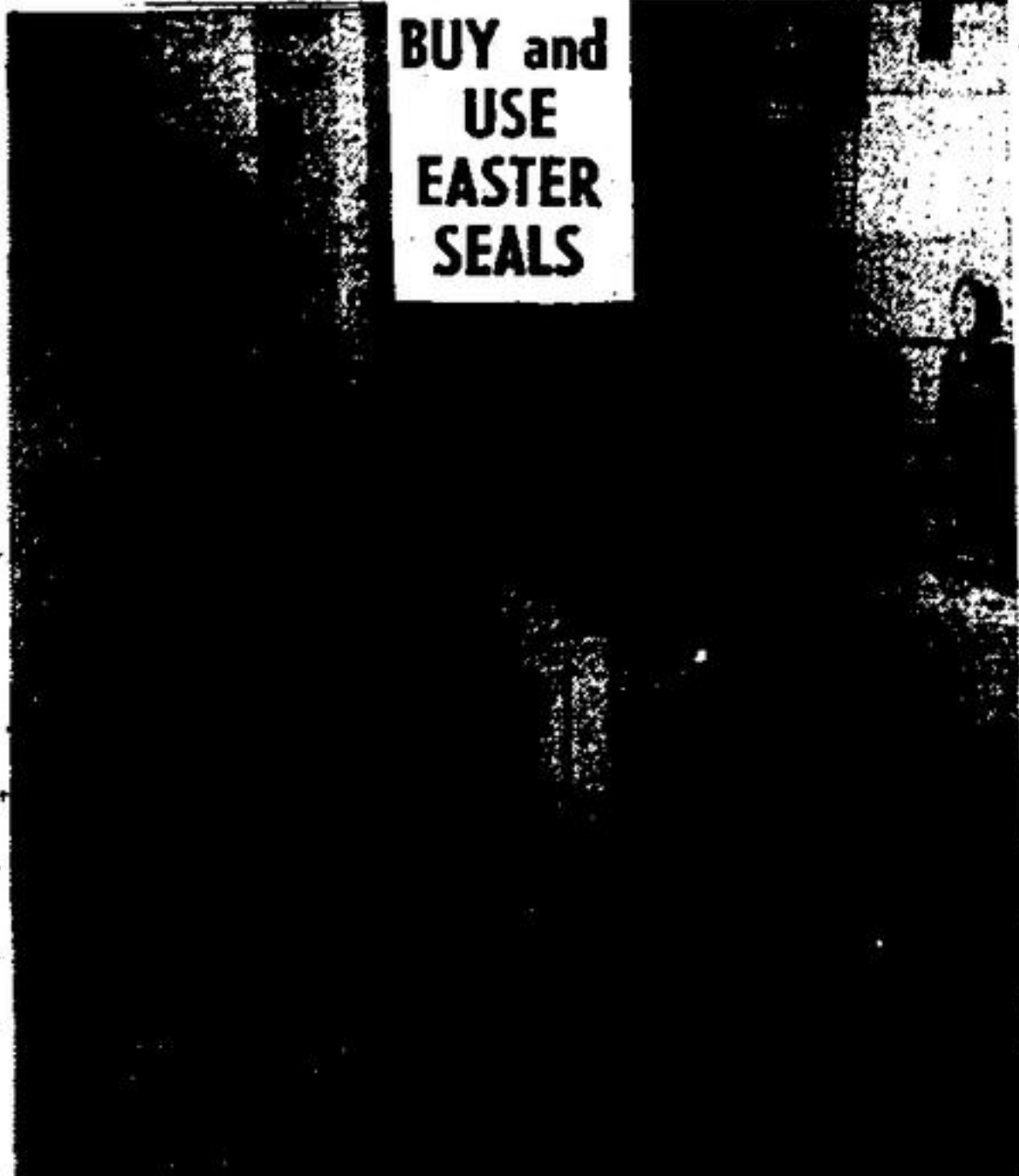

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**NEVER BUILT ON? HYDE QUESTIONS LAND SALE TERMS**

The \$500 offer to purchase made by Maple Avenue Baptist Church for land adjoining the church was accepted by Council, Monday night.

The provision that the land would never be built upon, was questioned by Coun. Hyde. "Why should we restrict the land from being built on 'for ever'?" he asked. Our only concern is that the services running through there not be built on. Maybe twenty years from now it should be built on," he stated.

Coun. A. Speight explained that in talking to Rev. Bruce Woods he had been assured the Church was willing to go along with this provision, since they only wanted the area for parking and had no intention of building on it.

The final wording of the 'for ever' phrase will be left to the solicitor when he is drawing up the agreement.

**BOOK OF KELLS FEATURES TOUR BY LATIN CLUB**
