HALTON CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY RETURNS EXECUTIVE

Rev. Canon C. M. Mitchell of Burlington was named president of the Halton County Children's Aid Society for a second consecutive term on Thursday, March 24th.

At a director's meeting immediately following the annual general meeting of the Society in the auditorium of Halton

Centennial Manor, the nominating committee's report submitted by Warren Harding of Burlington was unanimously accepted.

Eighteen members have been named to the over-all Society executive, which consists of the Executive Committee of nine members and the Management Committee of nine members.

Canon Mitchell is president of the Executive Committee and Douglas V. Latimer of Georgetown is immediate past president. Vice president is John A. Elliott of Georgetown. Mrs. Paul Lanz of Burlington is secretary and Mr. Harding is treasurer. The four Halton County Council representatives on the
