

Norval Juniors Have Top Play in Drama Festival

Norval Junior Farmers' one-act comedy "Bread" by Fred Eastman was judged top play of three presented March 6th at Halton Junior Farmers' annual drama festival. St. Paul's United Church Christian Education Building in Milton was at "standing room only" capacity as a large audience enjoyed the three plays by Norval, Palermo and Acton clubs.

Brian Bessey of the Acton club was named best actor for his part as 'Donald Hoofle' in Acton's play 'A Young Man's Fancy'. Gwen Kovachik, who played the mother in 'A Private Affair' presented by the Palermo club, was named top actress.

Mrs. William Braln accepted the W. I. Dick trophy on behalf of the Norval club, from the late Halton Crown Attorney's son Jim Dick. Halton-Peel Home Economist Mrs. Patricia Squire presented the Margaret Alice Elliott trophy to Miss Kovachik and Extension Fieldman Geoff Taylor, awarded the J. E. White-lock trophy to Mr. Bossey.

Cast of the Norval play included: Carol Devereaux, Marg Alexander, Don Hamilton, Bill Alexander, Wilma Mason, and Ruth Mason. Acton actors were Don Swackhamer, Judy Britton; Brian Bessey, Earl Burt and Pat Manes, and the play was directed by Leon Duffield. The Palermo play, directed by Mrs.

E. Oates, included Gwen Kovachik, Marg Pelletier, Vera Thompson, Lois Hunter, Harold Thompson, Dan Heaberlington, and Dave Norton in the cast.

Adjudicator Verne Shaw, director of Guelph Little Theatre, praised each of the plays and offered constructive criticism on several points at the conclusion of the evening.

Awarding of the W. I. Dick trophy to the Norval club makes it the ninth time the club has claimed the top honours. Palermo has held the trophy six times, Acton and Milton four times each, Burlington once and Kilbride once.

The Norval play goes on to a zone competition at Oxford, April 9th. Winner of the competition will advance to the Provincial Finals in Guelph later in April.

Halton MP Wants "Mac" Made National Fruit

Proclamation of the McIntosh apple as Canada's national fruit seems almost a sure thing.

A private member's bill, sponsored by Halton MP Harry Har-ley, to give the McIntosh national recognition received first reading in the House of Commons Thursday.

The bill, the culmination of almost two years of campaigning by Arthur Kemp, a Burlington apple grower, appears to have little or no opposition.

"It has the support of all fruit and vegetable growers across Canada," Mr. Kemp stated yesterday.

He said it has the support of the Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association and the Canadian Horticultural Council, headed by Dr. John Brown of Milton. The horticultural council represents Canada's fruit, vegetable and flower growers.

26 Recommendations Offered Needs Study Hearing Close

Twenty-six briefs were presented to Needs Study Commissioner Thomas Plunkett during hearings in Halton County last week. The hearings opened Tuesday March 22 and concluded Thursday March 24.

Mr. Plunkett was commissioned by the Province to inquire into and review Peel and Halton local government.

The hearings produced such varied recommendations as these:

OAKVILLE — Recommends most of Halton and parts of Peel, Wentworth, and Dufferin Counties be combined in a Super City.

MILTON — Wants more consideration given to developing the county gradually to a point where new type of government might be established.

MILTON PLANNING BOARD — Suggested Halton be divided into three municipalities with the Lower Base Line, and the Campbellville sideroad the dividing lines.

HALTON COUNTY — Favours amalgamation of Peel and Halton Counties to form a single regional government.

Georgetown and Esqueping Township did not submit briefs.

BURLINGTON — Suggests a two-tier metropolitan form of government be established across the southern portion of Peel and Halton.

ACTON — Wants Halton to be separate from Peel with its own Metro type government.
