Memorial Arena In the Black \$31,728 Was Its 1965 Take

Georgetown Memorial Arena, ended 1965 in the black a financial statement contained in the annual Town of Georgetown auditor's report now being printed reveals.

The arena's 1965 revenue totalled \$47,706 compared to expenditures of \$46,322. The arena took in \$31,728, and the balance of revenue (\$15,978) represents the arena's share of money raised by municipal taxes.

Second to money from the town, money raised by ice rentals (\$12,413) was the large item in the revenue column. The arena's share of hockey receipts contributed \$5,487, roller skating put \$5,174 into the arena treasury.

Ice skating accounted for \$4,281 of the revenue, and the lobby canteen added \$2,424.

Miscellaneous sources, including Rose Room rental, were worth \$1,400.

The largest figure under Expenditures is \$11,687 for capital expenditures of which a stock of roller skates, and new seats are the main items.

Other expenditures were for total wages (\$10,364) repairs maintenance (\$6,522), utilities (\$3,693), junior hockey club's gate share (\$2,441), general insurance (\$2,311), scraping and flooding (\$1,963), skating expense, cashier, doorman, etc. (\$886) advertising and telephone (\$760) referees and linesmen (\$370), hockey expenses, cashier, doorman etc. (\$469), water, \$500 and OHA fees (\$347) to list the main entries.

Swimming Pool took in \$6,178 and paid out \$6,078 the auditor's report shows.

Revenue came from: gate receipts (\$2,835), lessons (\$3027) container refunds (\$175), and canteen (\$141).

Expenditures were mainly wages (\$4,738), chemicals (\$379) repairs and maintenance (\$324) hydro (\$163), water (\$150), and printing (\$104)
