In June, 1953, she came second in the Miss International Air Hostess competition in Queensland, Australia, from among stewardesses of 18 airlines representing 12 countries.

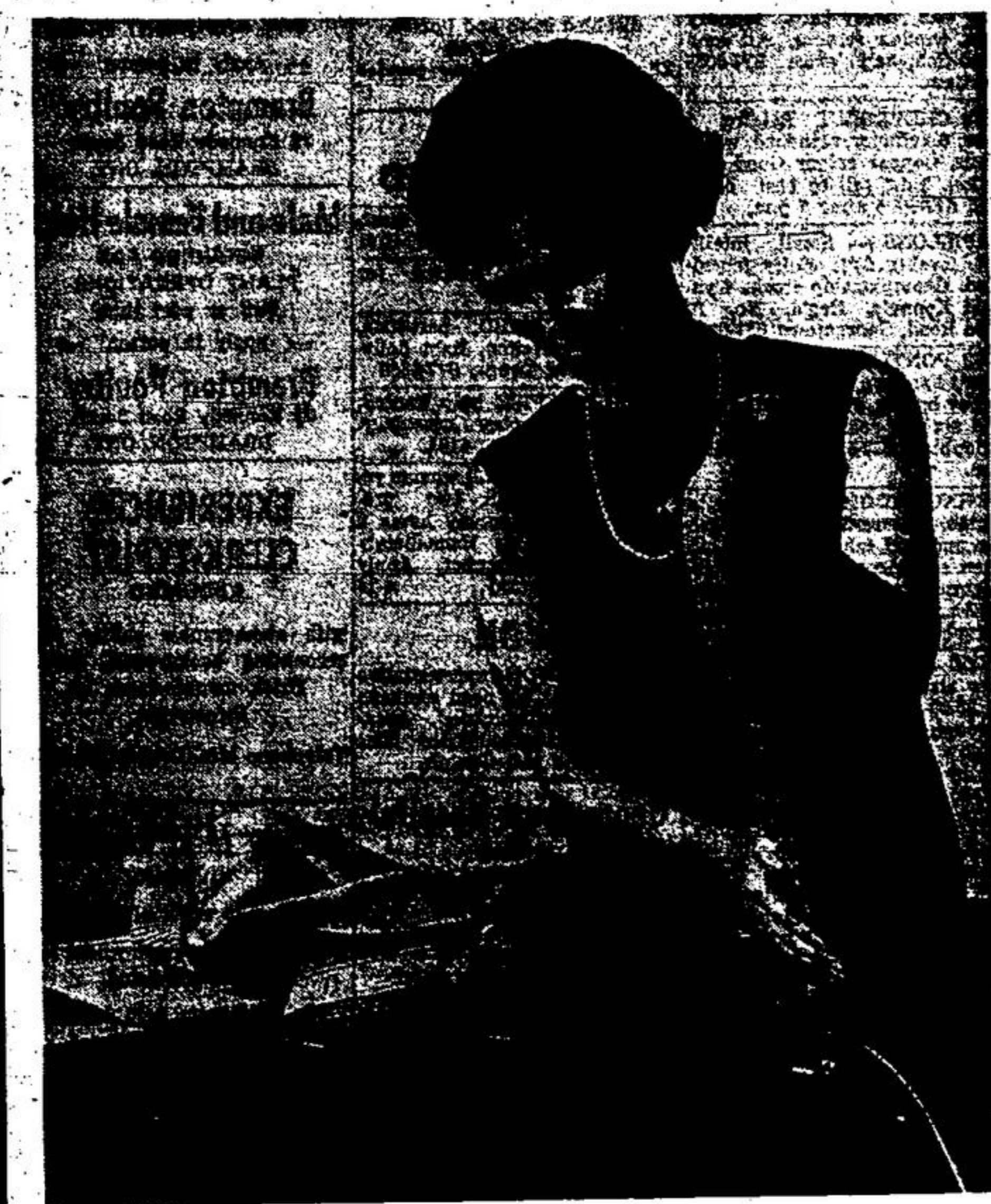
NECK HURT IN CRASH ON HIGHWAY
