Was General Manager of Kitchener Chamber of Commerce

Stephen Jones, 76, manager of the tourist and convention bureau of the Kitchener Chamber of Commerce and vice-president and general manager of Hiramchi Holdings Ltd. died Thursday at St. Mary's Hospital Kitchener, following a brief illness. His son James S. Jones is a Georgetown funeral director.

Mr. Jones was general manager of Kitchener Chamber of Commerce from 1951 to 1964 when he retired.

He was born at Bangor, Wales and came to Canada in 1907. Educated in Great Britain and the United States, he enlisted with the 18th Battalion in 1915 and served overseas. During World War 2 he served at RCAF headquarters.

Before 1919 he operated a specialist customs and tariff business at Toronto and Ottawa. In 1923 he was appointed a pensions commissioner by the federal government.

Ask Liquor Store Be Open Friday Nights

With only Councillor W. Emerson opposed, a motion to request the Liquor Control Board of Ontario to allow the local outlet to extend its hours till nine o'clock Friday night was passed by Council, Monday night.

Coun. A. Speight explained that several businessmen had mentioned it to him, each feeling that business was lost to surrounding towns because of the early closing of the liquor store.

The mayor pointed out that a copy of this motion must be sent to the Liquor Control Board, and that the local manager had no voice in the matter.

He was a member of many organizations including Toronto and Montreal Boards of Trade, Highland Fusiliers, Royal Canadian Legion, Westmount Golf and Country Club, 18th Batt. association, Waterloo County Auto Club and was a past director of Pioneer Village.

Like his son, he was a prominent Lions Club member and had served as deputy district governor, as well as president of his own club. He bred and showed hackney horses, assisted in forming the Central Ontario Horse Show. He was a member of St. John's Anglican Church, Kitchener.

Surviving are his wife, Ruby Frederickson, one son, James of Georgetown and daughters Mrs.
