### Georgetown, Leamington In Finals

Georgetown Bantams meet Leamington for the C Division championship in one of the International Bantam Hockey Tournament finals Saturday. The game starts at 11 a.m.

It's the first time a Georgetown team has reached a tournament final since 1962 when they won the C title.

Georgetown Bantams gained the division final by taking Streetsville Bantams 9-1 in a two-game total goals semi-final round Monday.

If Georgetown captures the C division crown, they'll be pitted against the A champions in the Grand Championship semi-finals at 3:30. The Grand Championship game starts at 7 p.m.
