Health Unit Expenditure Was \$366,000 Last Year

The annual report of the Halton County Health Unit released yesterday shows a total of \$365,926.61 in spending over the year. Nearly \$125,000 of this came from the municipalities in the county, the rest from the province.

The major share of this was \$285,927.67 in salaries for the 52 full time and three part time employees now working at the unit.

Another \$79,998.94 went to pay for equipment, travel, rent and utilities.

During the year 12 cases of Infectious Hepatitis were reported with an increase in the number of cases being reported from the northwest portion of the county toward the end of the year. There were also seven cases of scarlet fever, one of impetigo of the newborn and another food poisoning.

Tuberculosis struck 18 in the county all of whom were admitted to sanatoriums. Only 3 of these cases were old cases reactivated.

Syphilis and Gonorrhoea was found in 14 men and 11 women in the county. Follow-up investigation found 12 males and 19 females had contact with persons carrying the disease.

In all, the 21 public health nurses made 31,559 calls during the year, the majority to mothers of newborn and infant children.

Inspection of sanitation services divided into three categories shows:

WATER SUPPLIES
Out of 492 municipally operated water systems inspected, 24 were found unsatisfactory while out of 527 private supplies 205

were unsatisfactory. Five out of 13 cisterns inspected were also found not suitable.

SEWERAGE SYSTEMS
Out of 1,472 septic tanks 239 were found unsatisfactory.

RECREATIONAL SANITATION
All of the eight swimming pools inspected by the unit were found satisfactory.

OTHER SERVICES
Other services inspected all

with satisfactory rating were 223 barber shops and beauty salons, 121 houses, 91 inspections for rabies and seven into air pollution.

Over 541 inspections were made of 154 eating establishments with 224 inspections showing unsatisfactory conditions. Thirteen processors and caterers were inspected 55 times with 18 unsatisfactory conditions reported. Eight food distributors and vendors were inspected 213 times with 46 unsatisfactory inspections.

James Warren, who opened a design consulting office in the Carrol Building last July, has moved to a new location at 39 Main Street South.

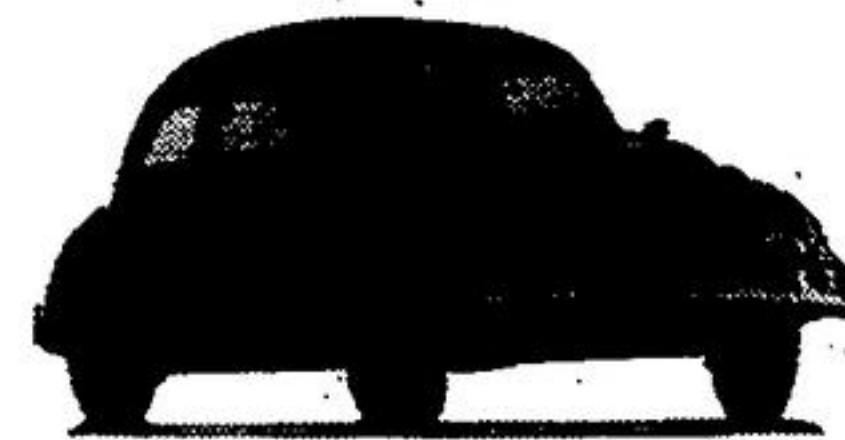
