

**Plan Would Give Students Taste of Business World**

Last Monday night, the Georgetown Rotary Club listened to, and discussed with interest a proposal by Mr. Donald Turner, Principal of the Georgetown District High School. The proposal, which was made recently by the Rotary Club, involves the placement, during a one or two week period, of certain selected students in business or merchandising offices, for a Work Week.

Mr. Turner stated that there are about 40 to 50 students in the Stenographic Clerical, and Special Commercial classes who would be eligible for such work, all in Grade 12. The Rotary Club will contact various local business establishments to arrange placement for the period, which is expected to be in January or February next year.

The experience for the students will be invaluable in showing them what the cold, hard world of business is really like, and how their studies will assist them in obtaining preferred employment. The various businessmen will gain too, and will be expected to report on the students when the program is completed.

The students will attend work without pay, but will not replace anyone, in fact one requirement is that they be attached to another employee for observance of procedures and a chance to exhibit their own capabilities. In expressing the thanks of the club for Mr. Turner's attendance.

Ralph Ussel stated that Georgetown as a whole will be the winner, since a project such as this cannot fail to assist both students and businessmen. Letters to various business establishments will be mailed soon giving further particulars.

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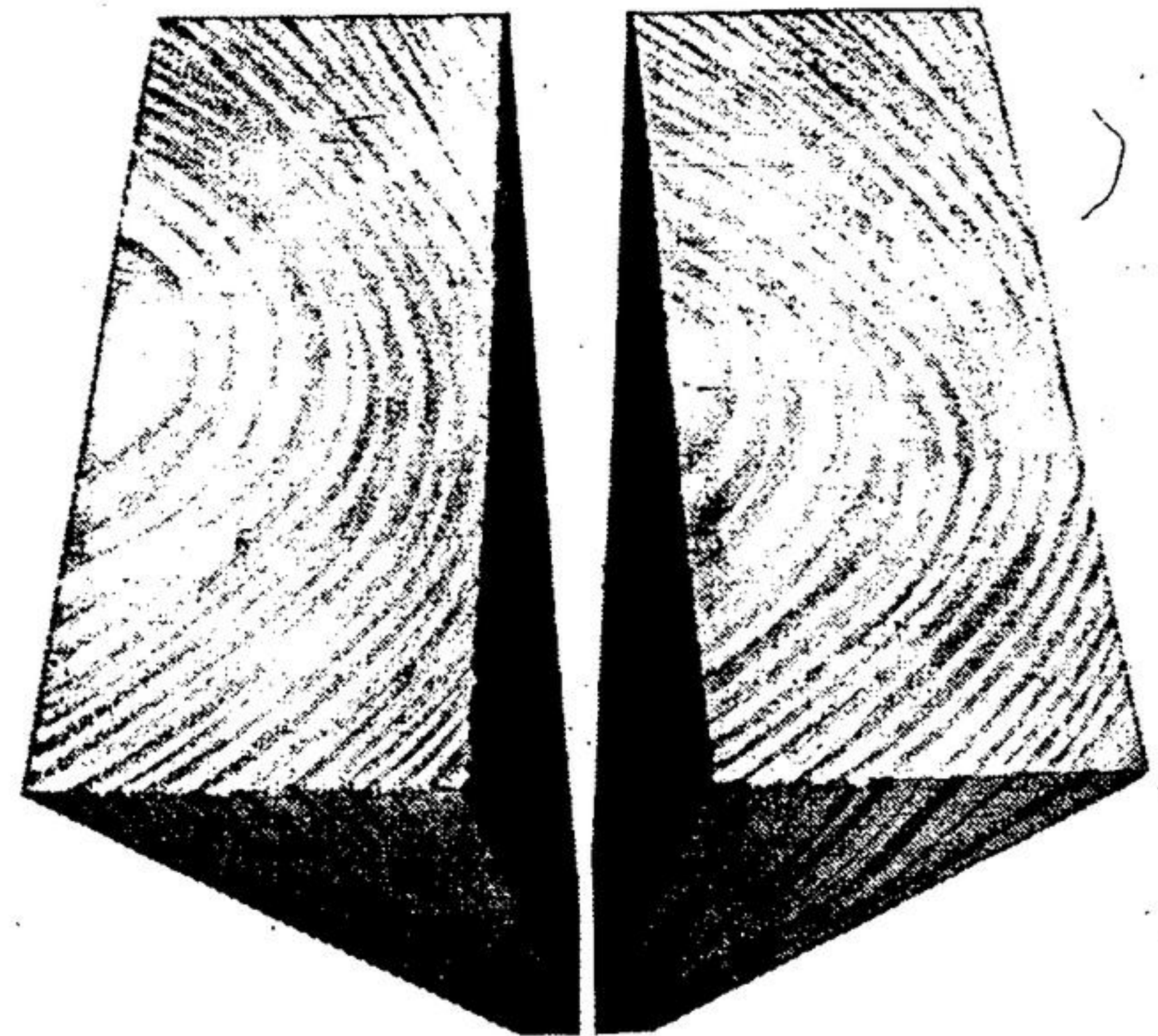
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**Cyclist Hits Car Has Minor Injuries**
