Three diamond ruffs in dummy plus six trump and the ace of diamonds in declarer's hand add up to ten tricks.

Always remember to make a plan and count your tricks.

**LET'S PLAY BRIDGE**

I wish to apologize to my readers for the lack of a column last week. The Canadian National Bridge Tournament in Toronto took too much of my time.

I return this week to a theme that I have written about before. When should you draw trump and when shouldn't you draw trump? I have said it before, but it bears repeating. "Draw trump unless you have a good reason not to do so"

Here is a hand where as soon as declarer makes his plan, he will not draw trump. Let's see why.

Board No. 18 from the Acton Bridge Club. Dealer is West, and North-South are vulnerable.

North  
S-Q 9 7 6 3  
H-A Q 5

West East  
S-A K 10 8 5 S-4 2  
H-9 8 H-8 7 2  
D-J 8 D-K 10 7 4 3  
C-A K Q J 8 C-10 5 4

South  
S-J H-K J 10 6 4 3

Suggested bidding:  
West North East South  
1C Pass Pass 1H  
1S Pass Pass 2D

There is a terrific temptation for West to double, but this should be resisted. In fact, three Wests did double, but two of them regretted it. The third one had a declarer who liked to draw trump.

Let's see what declarer's problem is when West leads the club king or the spade king. Declarer counts his tricks — six trump and the diamond ace. That is only seven tricks. Maybe the diamond finesse will work, but that's still only eight tricks. Where can the other two come from?

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**IN THE MAIL BAG**  
**Says Compulsory Union Against Code For Labour**

Dear Sir:  
It has come to our attention that on April 12 the thirty hourly-rated employees of Eagle Signals Ltd., Georgetown, members of the United Auto Workers of America, went on strike to back their demand for an initial collective agreement after negotiations had broken down on the issue of union security.

It is astonishing that the UAW has followed this sad course of action. Instead of seeking to uphold the workers' freedom of association the UAW is dictatorially demanding that a clause be written into the contract making it compulsory for all employees to join or pay UAW dues in order to hold or obtain employment.

We believe that such a freedom-robbing provision is against the principles set out by the Ontario Labour Relations Act which states in Section 3: 'Every person is free to join a trade union of his own choice,' and which declares in Section 52 that: 'No person shall seek by intimidation or coercion to compel any person to become or refrain from becoming or continue to be or to cease to be a member of a trade union...'

It also violates the principle of freedom of association as guaranteed by The Canadian Bill of Rights and also set forth in Article 20 of the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights to which Canada subscribes and with which The Ontario Human Rights Code declares itself to be in accord, namely: 'Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association' and 'No one may be compelled to belong to an association.'

We sincerely hope that the UAW will not persist in its erroneous course of action and that both sides pay due respect to the constitutional rights and freedoms of all Canadian workers.

**Caused Disturbance, Place Youth On Year's Probation**

A Georgetown youth was placed on a year's probation in County Court by Magistrate James Black, Wednesday.

The 18 year old was found guilty a week earlier of causing a public disturbance and swearing.

He was appearing with a 21 year old Georgetown man charged with a similar offence.

Magistrate Black told the youth, "You do not apply yourself as well as you might to make yourself a good citizen."

To the 21 year old, Magistrate Black said, "The court cannot imagine why you should get yourself involved in such a thing as this — it might be the company you keep."

He fined the man \$25 with \$13 costs, or ten days.

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
