

## Order Specifications for Proposed Police Building

Plans and specifications for a new public building were ordered Monday by council.

The building, on which tenders will be called, would be house-style, and located on a building lot which the town owns on James St. It would be so designed that it could some day be sold as a residence when a permanent location is found for the town police force.

Architect Ted Evans has been engaged to draw up plans, at a ceiling-price of \$400.

Crs. Emerson and Harrison voted against continuing with the idea of the building, and adding to costs already entailed in seeking a new location for the department, presently housed in a small area of the municipal building.

"We missed the boat in not purchasing the corner," said Mayor Gibbons. He referred to the former White Rose service station property adjoining the municipal building. It has been privately purchased and a new business block is shortly to be constructed there.

#### Wants Town to Annex Main Street Farm

Consideration for Georgetown annexing the former Cromar farm on Main St. S. has been asked of town council by a firm which plans to develop a housing subdivision on the property.

Morris & Son, which is calling the property Briar Hill subdivision, has approached the town on several occasions, seeking town water service.

Monday they asked, through a Toronto planning firm, that Georgetown consider the possibility of annexing the farm, which is just outside town limits.

While the request was turned over for committee discussion later, Mayor Gibbons remarked "Personally I don't think we should have any part of this at the present time."

Another request for water service to a house on the 7th Line adjoining the golf course at the top of Stewarttown hill, was referred to the water committee. A Schouten was told he would be informed later if council favoured extending water service to his house. A town line across the road serves a number of Esqueusing homes along the road.

## MAY PUT TIME LIMIT TOWN LOT BUYERS

Opposing sale of a town lot on Princess Anne Drive, Cr. Roy Ballentine told council Monday that when a lot is sold there should be a stipulation demanding that a house be erected within a certain time.

"We sold one lot last fall and there is still no building," he said. "We have no guarantee when a house will be built, and meanwhile we are not getting the anticipated tax revenue."

While Cr. Ballentine's idea was commended by other councillors, and may be adopted as a future policy, council concluded the sale of a lot to William Barratt.

"We committed ourselves last week and I don't think we could back out after we accept a purchase offer," said Mayor Gibbons.

Reeve Hunter said the town is selling the lots too cheaply and he will vote again any future sales until council has the property appraised.

Cr. Ern Hyde sided with Cr. Ballentine and voted against the sale when council declined to add a building limit clause into the by-law. The bid was sold to Mr. Barratt on a 7-2 vote.

No action was taken on a purchase offer for \$1,000 submitted by John A. MacKenzie for a lot on Hyde Park Drive.
