The Georgetown Tykes will have their first practice on Saturday morning, May 7th, at 10 a.m. All boys who were 10 years old before January 1, 1966 are eligible and welcome to try out. This year's rookies will be handled by Brian Van Wyck of the Juveniles.

The Midgets and Juveniles will practice again Sunday afternoon at 1:00 p.m. This year's midgets will be handled by Ray Whitman and Mike Tusk. However if some of the slower-turn-out midgets don't turn out by Sunday the club might be yanked from league play at the Monday night meeting.
