## Been Around for 50 Years Cadets Set for Inspection

One of the oldest active high school cadet corps in the Dominion will be on parade when Georgetown High School Cadet Corps No. 676 undergoes its annual inspection in the Georgetown park Wednesday, May 11.

Established in 1916 the local corps was originally commanded by Thomas Bingham. He was succeeded by Robert Cork. The present John R. Barber, joined the cadet corps in 1916 and was the OC in 1922 and 1923.

It will be Col. Barber of the Lorne Scots regiment who takes the salute and inspects the corps next week.

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Up until 1923 the boys trained with Ross rifles, now prized antiques, and wore stetson type hats. Later the khaki berets became the corps head dress and were part of the uniform until five years ago when the present headgear was adopted.

During the pre-World War 2 period, the school's principal Ralph Ross actively participated in the activities of the corps. Target training was done with Coeys which at that time were the latest thing. The affiliation between the corps and the Lorne Scots (Peel Dufferin and

Hutton Regiment) was established at the start of the war.

Since the war, J. Leonard Lambert, principal at the school for the thirty years prior to his term when he resigned, was also interested in the corps activities.

Today, the cadet corps uses modern FN automatic carbines instead of the old Coeys, and the signals division, which at one time counted old field radio sets among its equipment, has been streamlined with field telephone units known as No. 26 sets the major gear.

A colourful adjunct has been the girl cadets who wore navy blue middie, until recently scarlet tunics became their parade dress.

The longest term of command was that of Captain Alan Prouse, who stepped down two years ago. A.E. Roberts is currently in charge of the corps and gets able assistance from his wife, a sergeant at Lorne Regiment headquarters, who directs the girls section. Others from the teaching staff taking an active part are Blair Armstrong, and Michael Pelechak, and a private citizen Alan Teeter.

In the past couple of years, the cadet program has included trips to Camp Borden, rifle ranges, simulated battle schemes here and away as well as range work at Brampton.

Cadet officers and NCO's working with the ranks in preparation for Wednesday night are commanding officer Major Steve Ewing, 2IC Capt. Bill Adcock, Training Officer Capt. Clifford Levy, Lieut. Dennis Steif, Sgt. Major Randy Hibbert, Staff Sgt. John Graff and Sgt. Bob Barber.
