

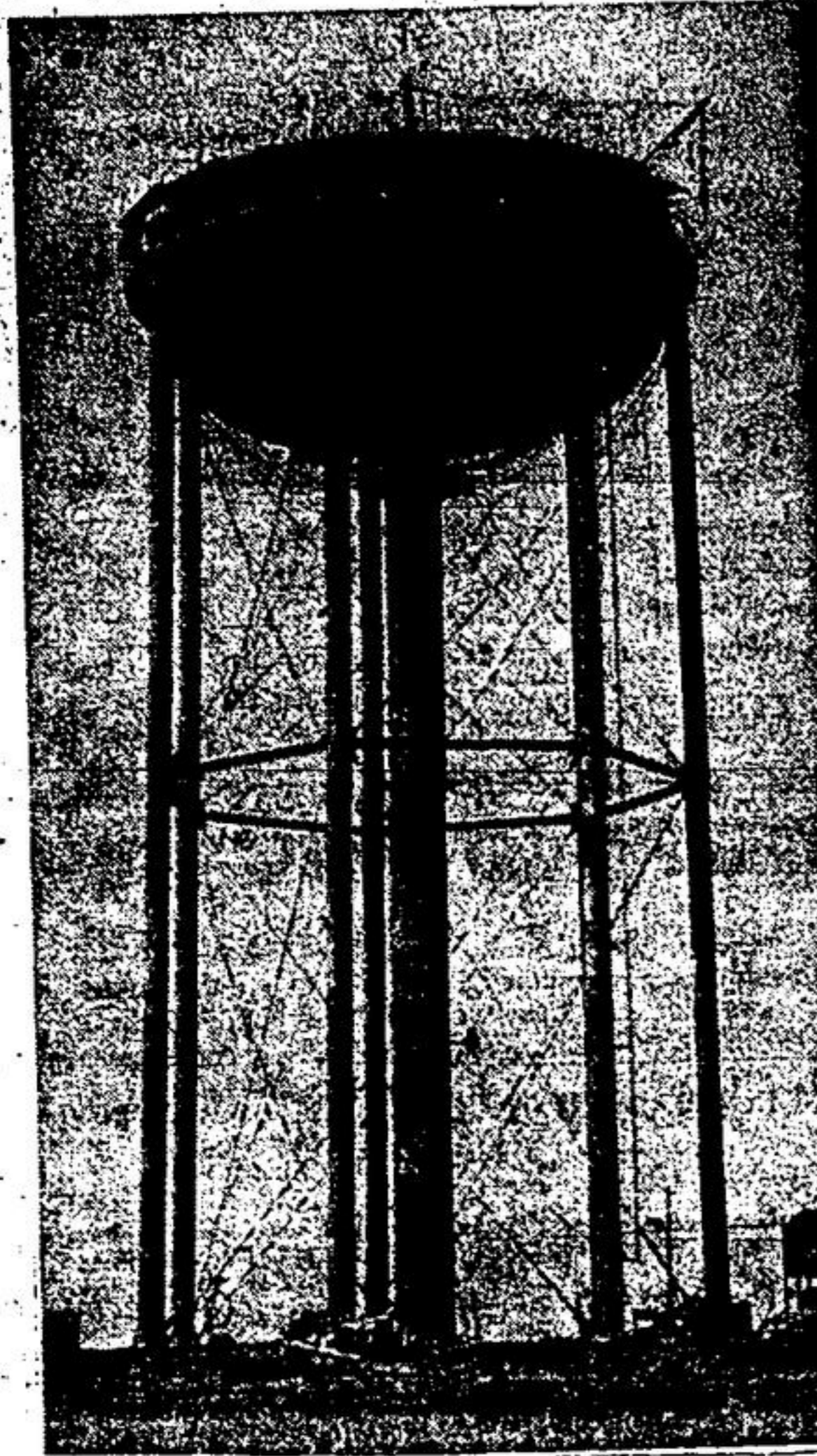
Overhead Water Tower to Operate Here by Mid-June

Mid-June is the date forecast for the one hundred and thirty five foot high water tower to be in operation, according to engineers Proctor and Redfern. However, townfolk will have to wait till September to see what colour will float above them. It will be shut down for two to three weeks during the painting.

The top of the half a million gallon capacity tank, fabricated and erected by Horton Steel, rises one thousand feet above sea level, and for anyone daring enough to try, commands a wide view of the surrounding territory.

The \$240,000 tank will control the pressure and supply the water to the whole town. With the tank, the pumps, which now operate twenty-four hours a day, will only operate when the level in the tank drops low enough to signal the pumps to start.

In an emergency such as the combined failure of both hydro, and the present stand-by diesel pump, water would still be fed into taps by gravity.
