Prospects Doubtful For 9th Line Bridge This Year

Council is not unanimous on going ahead this year with the widening of the Mountinview overhead railway bridge.

Pressing that the job be done, an area resident Del Majury criticized Mayor Gibbons for his opposition to the bridge and asked him what more important things there are on which to spend money when he addressed council on Monday.

"We need a breathing spell after heavy capital highway costs last year," the mayor told him. "And there are other projects, the Main St. bridge, the John St. underpass, an overhead crossing for pedestrians to get to work which must be considered too."

Cr. Hyde denied Mr. Majury's statement that his wife had been told by the councillor that there would be a bridge and sidewalks too.

"I do favour a pedestrian footbridge," he said. "A new bridge isn't any safeguard for children."

He said the John St. subway is more important and should be tackled first.

Cr. Fred Harrison reminded council of delegations a few years ago, and said he was glad to see Mr. Majury at the meeting.

"But remember all we voted for last week was to update the cost of a new bridge," he said. "It may take you and quite a few more ratepayers to get council to see the light."

Cr. Arthur Speight opined that if one child's life is saved the bridge expense is justified.

Toronto Firefighter Was Nephew Of Town Foreman

A Toronto fireman, Edwin Morette, 28, lost his life when he lost his way in a smoke-filled building and his airpax failed.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Morette of Toronto, he was a nephew of Georgetown's town foreman Frank Morette.

The \$100,000 fire at the Turnbull Elevator Co. on Yonge St. sent four other firemen to hospital suffering from smoke inhalation. Morette, a member of No. 10 aerial crew, was found in the basement of the building.
