

Repairing Car, Accident Kills Wesleyan St. Man

John William Duimering, age 28, was found dead under his car early Saturday morning five hours after he went to the garage at the rear of his Wesleyan St. home to repair a faulty muffler.

He was apparently crushed by the car which had slipped off the jack.

Four Georgetown police officers, Deputy Chief Robert Wilson, and Constables, Daniel Martip, Henry Vanierluis, and David Bell discovered the deceased. They were called in by Mrs. Rita Duimering, the dead man's wife, after she discovered he was missing.

Mrs. Duimering had retired shortly after her husband had gone to the garage to start to work on the car and awoke at 1 a.m. When she discovered he was not in the house she went to the door of the garage and called him. Receiving no answer she called her father Mr. Paul Dykxhoorn, of 187 Raylawn Cresc. who advised her to call the police.

Deputy Chief Wilson suspected what might have happened and took the other three officers with him to help lift the car. They discovered the deceased at 1:12 a.m. His chest had been crushed by the weight of the vehicle.

heavy 1962 Ford had been removed.

Mr. Duimering was a welder by trade and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Duimering of RR 2, Moorefield. As well as his parents and his wife, he leaves two young sons, Richard and Robert of Hamilton, and two brothers, William, of Guelph and Harry, of Moorefield.

Funeral service was held Monday afternoon in the Christian Reformed Church for John William Duimering, 28, Mr. Duimering was accidentally killed while repairing his car at his home on Wesleyan St. Friday night.

He was a welder by trade, employed with Rolling Specialties, and had formerly worked with Armstrong Brothers, Brampton and with Ed's Welding Milton.

He leaves his wife, Rita Dykxhoorn, whom he married in 1960, two sons Richard Jeffrey and Paul Robert, his parents Mr. and Mrs. Henry Duimering, a sister Mrs. Herman Stryker (Jennette) of Hamilton and brothers William of Guelph, Martin and Harry of Moorefield.

This will be the first of four kindergartens to be introduced in Esqueing over the next three years. Mr. Lawson stated the kindergartens would accommodate fifty children, twenty-five in the morning and twenty-five in the afternoon, and would
