A total of 289 hours of television were watched by the students taking part. Those with entertainment value only formed 37 per cent of the total; programs pertaining to sports accounted for 25 per cent of the total, educational programs 15 per cent, and news and weather 8 per cent.

On the average, students watched 6.6 hours of TV a week, or about one hour daily.

Monday, Saturday and Sunday were the most popular viewing days and channels 9 and 6 the most popular TV stations.

Magistrate James R. Black expressed concern Tuesday over the number of immigrants unable to speak or write English who still manager to hold drivers' licenses.

The magistrate expressed his concern in a Halton County court Monday when a Toronto man appeared before him on a charge of driving without a license.

The accused came to court with an interpreter to speak in his defense, and produced a new license, which caused Magistrate Black to wonder how he got it without being able to speak English.

Council Digs But Letter's Whereabouts Still Mystery


Despite some pointed enquiries, the whereabouts of a registered letter, addressed to town council in care of Mayor Gibbons, is still as much a mystery as it was a week ago.

At Monday's council meeting, the mayor had the last word. "You said last week you were satisfied," he told Cr. Harrison. "Everyone will have to be satisfied. Pursue the matter if you will. What can you do about it? Nothing."

The letter a copy of which had been read to council last week, was dated April 19. It was from a Toronto solicitor, R. L. Pringle, telling council that the John Inglis firm had dropped its option on 35 industrial acres here.

Last week, Reeve Hunter requested the clerk to tell council who signed for the letter. Mayor Gibbons denied ever seeing it, but said no blame should be attached to any municipal office employee.
