Two Names in Running for New Public School

Georgetown's new senior school could be the MacDonald-Pearson School, or Canada Centennial 1867-1967 School, unless somebody comes up with something better by June 1, the date of the next public school board meeting.

The MacDonald-Pearson and Canada Centennial names were suggested by property committee chairman Gudni Sigurdson at a meeting of the board on Wednesday May 4.

He said the first incorporates the names of Canada's first and current prime minister which makes it an appropriate way to mark the Canadian Centennial. Though he said he personally favoured the MacDonald-Pearson name, he presented Canada Centennial as an alternate choice when he found little support for his initial proposal.

The second proposal drew less comment from the other school trustees.

"It is important that the school be given a name soon," Mr. Sigurdson commented. He has advocated a name referring to Canada's Centennial next year since the school's plans were given the go ahead, and has taken a personal interest in the naming.
