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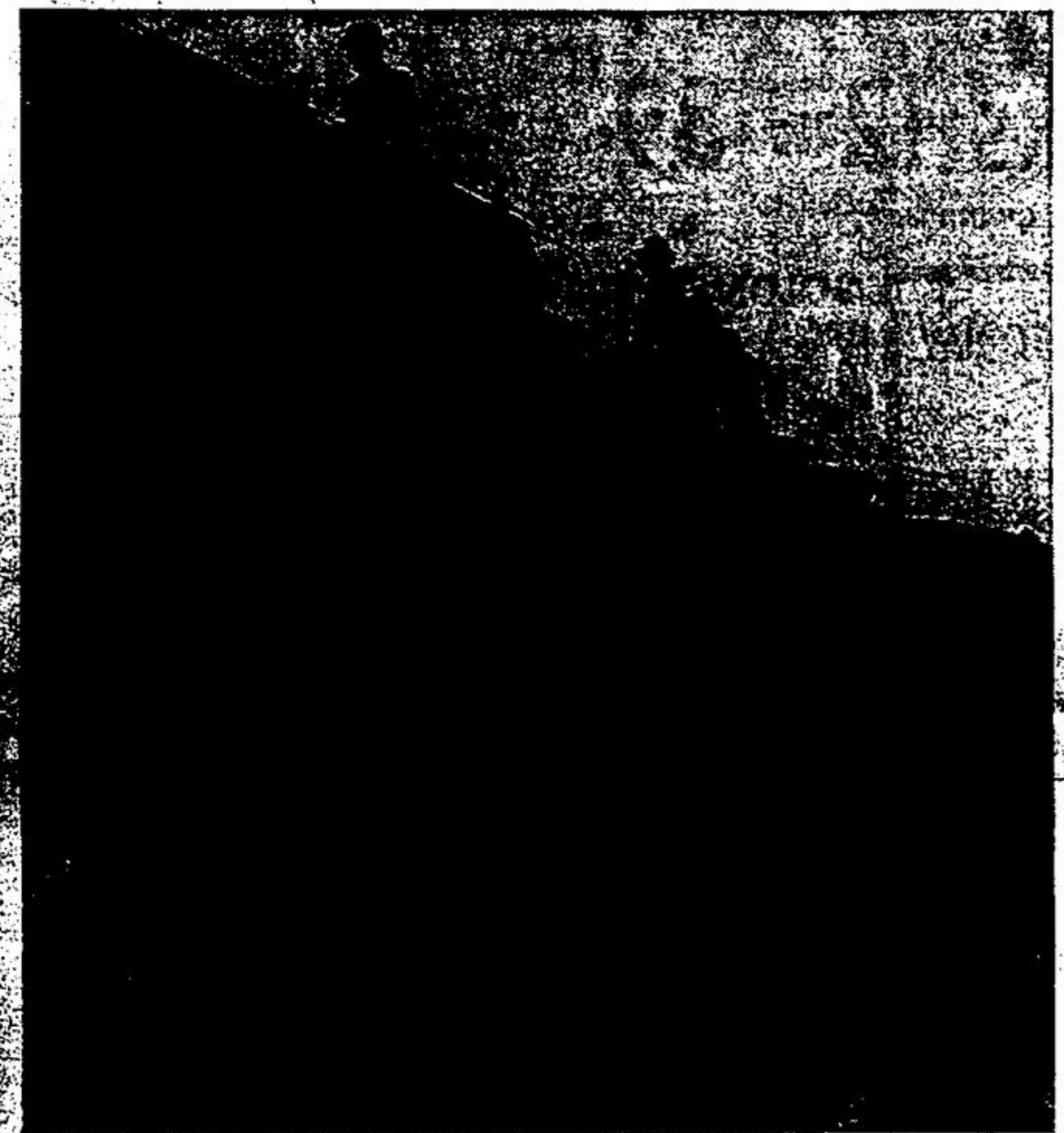

## Teaching Salary Schedule Sets Maximum at \$8300

Teachers in the Esquimaux Public School Area system will have a basic salary schedule ranging from \$3,800 to \$8,300 commencing September 1 it was disclosed this week with the release of the township salary figures.

Level 1	Min. \$3,800	Max. \$5,600
Level 2	\$4,100	\$6,700
Level 3	\$4,500	\$7,500
Level 4	\$5,000	\$8,300

Principal's salary is based on the teachers schedule, above, plus additional allowances of \$200, \$500, \$800 and \$1,100 depending on Level-plus \$75 per classroom in his school.

## Assure Park Residents Hell Drivers No Hazard

A report of a Kinsmen Club plan to bring a team of hell drivers here June 17 apparently has some Georgetown Park area residents apprehensive. Ken Milne an officer with the sponsoring club told the Herald Tuesday that he had learned indirectly that some residents in the immediate area of the park had voiced complaints about the project although none had been made to the club.

"I think it's just a case of misunderstanding," Mr. Milne commented. "Our show will be performed entirely in the area in front of the grandstand, so if there is any worry about the cars leaving the track and swerving into back yards there need not be."

Mr. Milne said the club hopes to use a water truck and calcium chloride to keep the dust down. He said there will be off-duty police and a Kinsmen to keep the children out of the area in which the hell drivers are performing, and it's likely teachers will be moved into the infield to semi-enclose the area in front of the grandstand.

Miss Laura Trebil, who operates the RR 1 Georgetown kennel, handled the pup in both shows.

## Two-Stage Boost Agreement In New Police

An agreement with Georgetown Police Association which calls for a 5% salary increase this year and 10% boost next year received council approval Monday.

The agreement is for a two year period and among changes increases statutory holidays to nine from eight, upgrades overtime allowances, and provides 1 1/2 days per month accumulative sick leave, to a maximum of 150 days.

"The police are happy and so are we," remarked police chairman Jim Young. "This is a good agreement for both parties."

## COUNCIL BRIEFS

With Jack Armstrong as spokesman, residents of Parkview Blvd attended Monday's council meeting to ask that curbs and a paved road be provided on that street.

Mr. Armstrong explained that natural drainage precludes the need of storm sewers and said that as the street is a dead end and not heavily travelled, paving would not need to be as wide as on most streets.

## Expect Dennison Factory Deal Signed by May 26

Georgetown may soon have a new industry.

Dennison Manufacturing Co. which has been negotiating for purchase of industrial land from the town, is close to signing for a 10 acre tract on Todd Road. The acreage adjoins a site acquired earlier this year by Rolling Specialties and is across the road from the General Fireproofing plant now under construction.

The firm has long range plans for expanding in progressive stages.

According to a letter read from the firm on Monday, Dennison is prepared to complete purchase arrangements by May 26.

Council okayed the sale agreement Monday.

## Smashes Guard Rails Car Plunges To Tracks

Police are still investigating a spectacular automobile accident during the early hours of Friday morning May 13 in which a car left Main Street N. at the railway bridge and plunged down a steep embankment.

According to police report the vehicle, registered to Frederick Currie 32 Eastern St., Acton was northbound when it left the pavement, ploughed through a guard fence at the approach to the bridge and rolled down a bank its momentum finally being checked by a large hydro pole near the railway track level.

Police are still attempting to determine who was driving the vehicle when it made the plunge at about 2:20 a.m.

Damage to the car was placed at \$800, and to the bridge railing \$80.

## Worshipping in Public School Hope for Chapel By August

Construction of a chapel for Immanuel Lutheran Church is under way with April 1, 1967, the target date for completion. A Georgetown company, Dax Developments, has the building contract.

The site is located on the corner of Windsor Rd. and Carole St. and will serve the worship and educational needs of the growing congregation which first met together in a service conducted by Rev. John Kliffner in September 1963.

The building's exterior will be of brick veneer and will embrace 1,240 square feet of floor space.

Mr. Henry Keire, a member of the congregation, drew the plans for the chapel. Mr. Harold Brandt is chairman of the building committee which includes G. Mikoleit, R. Diegel and B. Schmidt.

The congregation is currently worshipping in the Howard Wrigglesworth Public School on Guelph Street.

Rev. Kliffner was called to this mission by the Ontario District of Lutheran Church Canada.

Major Earl Line of C Company Lorne Scots, with Lt. F. Roberts his Aide-De-Camp, represented the unit with which the Cadet Corps is affiliated. Lt. Bell and S. Sgt. Enright were Oakville Central Command representatives.

## Council Still Discussing Addition, New Building

While council is proceeding with plans for a house-style police building on James St., there is still some idea of a municipal building addition, or purchase of other property in some councillors' minds.

"Let's decide what we're going to do," said Cr. Harrison Monday. "If we're going to ignore the advice we paid \$1,000 for, and now spend \$400 on plans for a building which might never be built, we're getting nowhere."

Mayor Gibbons said any enquiries he has made about an addition have not cost the town anything and any councillor has the privilege of checking as long as it entails no cost.

"I've never dismissed the possibility and wisdom of an addition," he said.

Cr. Ballentine argued that to acquire parking land behind the municipal office which could include a house might cost over \$50,000.

Deputy Reeve Young said he has been looking into another possibility, purchase of a 2-story house in the downtown area which could be acquired for \$18,000.

## Reject \$1700 Offer For Hyde Park Lot

A year's effort to buy a building lot from the town on Hyde Park Drive was stalemated Monday when council split 4-4 on a vote to sell the land to John A. Mackenzie for \$1700.

It was the third offer submitted by Mr. Mackenzie.

Deputy Reeve Young, Crs. Harrison, Ballentine and Hyde opposed the sale, with the Mayor and Crs. Emmerson, Smith and Speight supporting it. Deputy Reeve Hunter was absent from the meeting.

Cr. Ballentine and Harrison pointed out that lots had been valued at \$2100 in a report ordered from a realtor. Mayor Gibbons said that while this should apply to future sales, the fact that an offer had been received a year ago made a difference.

Cr. Emmerson pointed out that \$2100 is the average value of the lots and that specific prices can vary.

"We sold 80 feet frontage for \$1300 not so long ago. This is only 60 feet so we're getting a better price," said Cr. Smith.

## Need \$1500 to Reach Cancer Campaign Goal

Over five thousand of the six thousand five hundred dollar goal of the Cancer Society's campaign covering Georgetown, Acton, and surrounding area has been raised, according to campaign chairman Reg. Broomhead. He predicts the goal will be reached over the next few months.

Three hundred canvassers, plus area chairmen and organizers took part in the April fund raising, of which over half goes to support research teams.

The Cancer Society is not a member of the United Appeal, since they feel their distribution of educational pamphlets and advertising is just as important as raising money. Under a general Appeal like the United Appeal they could not stress the danger signals of cancer and the urgency of early diagnosis as much as they can with their own campaign.

The Cancer Society is committed to keep research teams working, and paying their salaries. Through such research the "Pap smear" test has become commonplace cutting the incidence of cancer in women below past years.

The budget for each unit is set on a Canada-wide basis, with the budget being allocated on a population basis.
