Raiders Will Meet Oaks In Next Jr. C Campaign

Georgetown Raiders of the Ontario Hockey Association's Central Junior C League will have some new competition next season.

Jack Rogers, coach of last season's Oakville Midget Merchants, reports that the "green light" has been given Oakville for Junior Hockey next season.

The club has been bonded, there is a franchise, and local Oakville talent is available. Finalization is expected this week.

"There is no more speculation," says Rogers. "We'll have a hockey club."

A letter from Bob Hanley, president of the Ontario Minor

Hockey Association, has approved the Oakville application with the stipulations that it be Junior C and is composed of 100 per cent local talent.

At present the Central Junior C League is bursting at the seams with 12 teams and rumors are in the wind that the loop will be split next year into two separate leagues.

Teams from Georgetown, Milton, New Hamburg, Simcoe, Elmira, Hespeler, Hanover, Paris, Brantford, Preston, Orangeville and Dundas composed the league last season.

Georgetown Raiders won the season championship, and New Hamburg Hahns the playoff title.
