Reviewed by Directors Museum Centennial Plans

Proposals for changing of exhibits, opening of new areas and a centennial building were announced this week by Maj. H.J. Newman, director of Halton county museum.

Sketch plans of the centennial building to house large pieces of equipment were shown to the board. The new building would be located at the south-west of the present museum, and at right angles to it. When the area is landscaped the gardens in the centre will add even more to the attractiveness of the fine site in Kelso Conservation Area. Tenders have not yet been called for the project. It will be designed so wings may be added later.

Opening Dates

The blacksmith shop will be open and operational May 14. The new craft house will be open June 3 and part of the upstairs area in the former barn will be open to the public June 24.

In July exhibits will feature the newly opened craft house where weaving, spinning, sewing and carving will be shown. In August hand-powered farm equipment will be shown in the upstairs area in the former barn, where remodelling has been underway for some time. In September he will have a display of old photographs, and says he expects to ask local people to identify some of them not yet labelled. An exhibit of Indian artifacts is planned for October.
