

Delwilton Day Golfers Chip \$500 Into Worthy Causes

Knowledge of the course paid off for Georgetown Golf and Country club members Monday when 125 golfers went after the marbles in the fourth annual Delwilton Day tournament at the Georgetown course. Eight of the nine top prizes were won by home course members, and a large percentage of the balance of the 50 awards also went to Georgetown Golf men.

But the real big winners were the Brampton Lions and the Retarded Children's Fund who share the proceeds from this unique type of tourney.

All the costs of the affair, including the \$400 in prizes, is put up by the Delwilton Carpenters Company. Partners Harold Delwilton and Ray Wilson conceived the tourney in 1962 as a money-raiser for the Retarded Children's Fund. When Brampton Lions came into the picture to help organize and run the day, Delwilton stipulated that a percentage of the take still go to the retarded children's cause, consequently both Lions' service fund and the charity share the benefits.

Golfers taking part are not charged green fees, however, they are asked to make a donation to the combined funds. Monday's proceeds totalled \$500.

Delwilton Day can potentially raise about \$1,000 for the joint cause assuming entries reached the 350 capacity mark, but rain throughout most of Monday made the goal unattainable.

Georgetown Golf and Country Club champion, Mike Pullen, won the day's top prize for best net score with a 70. Ross Dibble had best gross score, a 74.

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Was Medical Advisor To Quebec Mining Companies

Funeral service was held in St. John's United Church here on May 10 for Dr. R. Stewart Fisher, a retired medical practitioner, who died on May 7 in West Haldimand Hospital, Hagersville.

Born in Esqueping Township in 1900, he was the son of the late Peter Miller Fisher and Florence Ann Dick. He attended Quatre Bras public school and after graduating from Georgetown High School received his medical training at the University of Toronto, graduating in 1923.

Dr. Fisher began his medical career when he was employed by the Backus & Brooks Lake of the Woods Milling Co. where he remained for four years. He spent four years with the Ontario Hydro at the Atitibi Canyon project.

His interest in industrial medicine led him to Bourlambaque, Quebec in 1934 where he remained for 31 years. It was there that he was assigned as medical advisor to Lamaque Mining Co. and Sigma Mining Co.

Dr. Fisher retired from his practice in 1963 due to illness. He leaves his wife, Lynda, Ellen Thompson, four children, Douglas of Ottawa, Phyllis of Toronto Marilyn of Cambridge, England and Charles of North Bay, and seven grandchildren.

Rev. Bruce Cunningham of Welland, who had been his minister at Bourlambaque conducted the funeral service and interment was in Park Lawn Cemetery, Toronto. Six cousins were pallbearers, James, Lloyd and George Fisher, Robert and Donald Lawson and Clayton Dick.
