Charles Ledwidge, a resident of Georgetown for the last 23 years died in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital on May 8th. He was born in Warwick, England and came to Canada in 1905. He worked first as a knitter at Beaumont Knitting Mill, then the Provincial Mill as a coater and later taking up farming until 1940 when he moved back to town and was in the Shock Absorber business for himself for four years prior to going to work at Smith and Stone Limited.
After his retirement Mr. Ledwidge worked as crossing guard for Holy Cross School for five years and had been crossing guard for three years at Wrigglesworth Public School at the time of his death.
