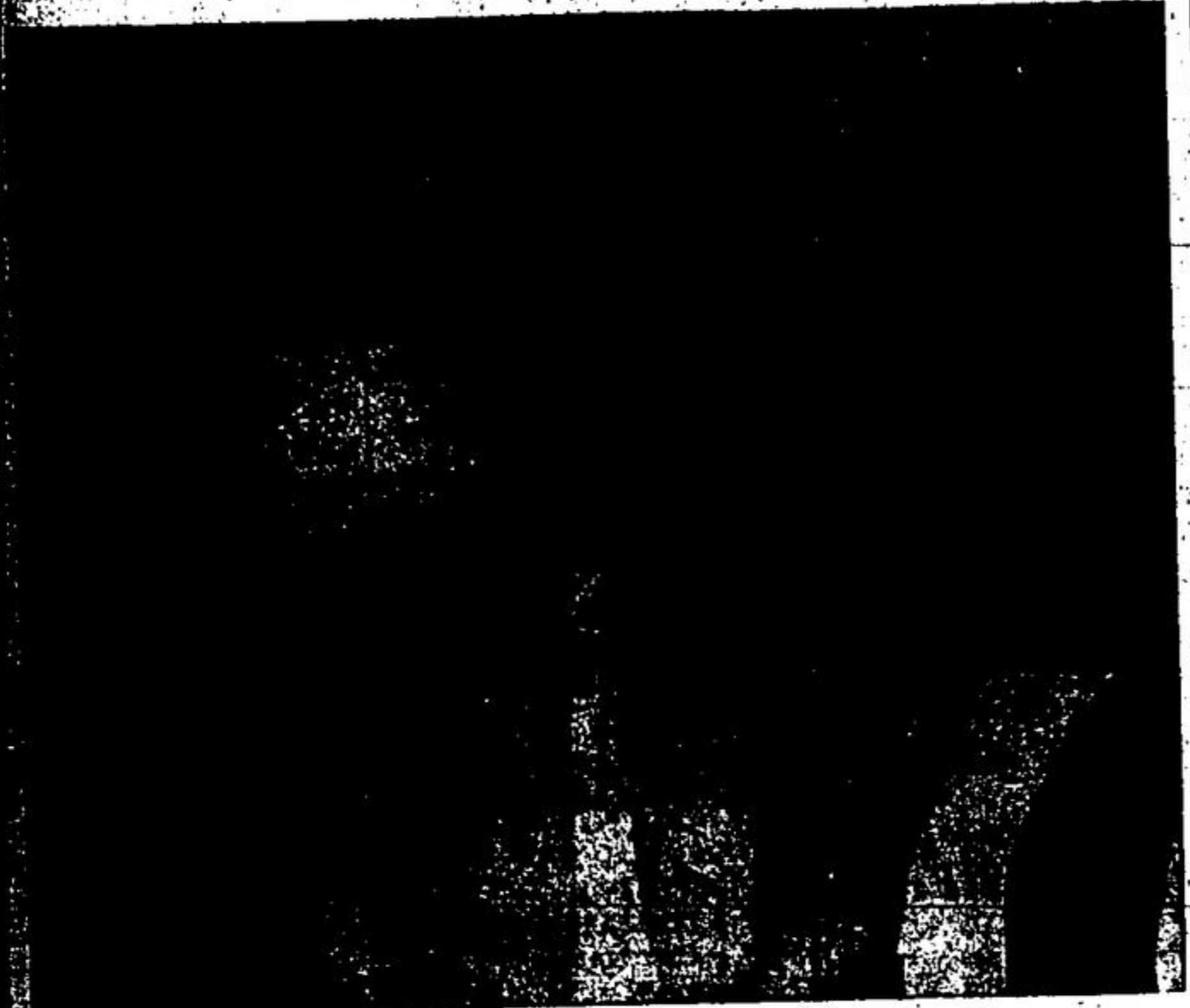

**HARLEY TO HALTON**

WEEKLY OBSERVATIONS BY DR. HARRY HARLEY, M.P. FOR HALTON

WEDNESDAY afternoon started in the House of Commons like any other afternoon, in the morning the various Parties had held caucus, followed by the usual business of correspondence and dictation. As the Session began at 2:35 p.m. I was in my usual place in the Chamber, below and to the Speaker's right of the Ladies Gallery. The routine matters were completed and the question period began. Suddenly there was a loud explosion coming from the front of the House of Commons lobby, in front of the main door of the Chamber. For a moment there was a stunned silence broken by whispers, queries and exclamations from Members and Gallery spectators alike. "It's a bomb!" cried a startled voice but there was no panic on the floor of the House or in the crowded Galleries. Nothing further happened at the moment and then the Speaker called for Order and the question period went on. I was suddenly summoned (along with four other doctors present in the House of Commons) and led to the men's washrooms just above and to the left of the open lobby in front of the main door of the House of Commons. The door appeared to be badly damaged. A glance inside showed that medical attention was already there, and already too late. I returned immediately to the House of Commons to hear the Leader of the Opposition ask the Prime Minister if we should adjourn. The Prime Minister agreed and suggested we meet at 4:00 p.m. to continue the business of the House. At that time the business of Parliament resumed, question period ended and we moved on to legislation.

ON MONDAY EVENING the Government survived its closest vote by a margin of seven votes. This was a non-confidence motion criticizing Government economic policies. The Government was expected to win the vote, and the actual vote was much closer than anyone had anticipated. Had the Government not received the support of three Social Credit Members it would have won by only a single vote.

**Youth Fined \$45. Careless Driving**

A Georgetown youth was fined a total of \$45 or eight days in county court Wednesday after he pleaded guilty to a charge of careless driving on Mountainview Rd. at Guelph St., April 8.

Assistant crown attorney Bruce Martin said the John St. West youth had lost control of his car while negotiating a curve in the road and had skidded off into a ditch leaving 228 feet of tire marks behind him.

The car was damaged to the extent of \$500. No one was injured.

THIS DREADFUL and frightening occurrence again reveals the lack of suitable security measures in our Houses of Parliament. 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**Every Modern Facility For Students at School for Deaf**

The Daughters of the Church (Anglican) enjoyed a tour of the Ontario School for the Deaf at Milton, Monday evening May 9.

The group was shown typical dormitories for the boys and girls, who, in the present accommodation, range in age from five years to fourteen. Under construction is a large new section, complete with gymnasium and residences, which will be used by older teenagers in the process of completing their high school education in academic as well as a very full line of vocational fields. This new development will be ready for occupancy in the fall.

The Daughters were interested in seeing the cafeteria with the latest and best of equipment for the boys and girls. The hospital was viewed from the outside, since there were several cases of measles under treatment. The work of the younger pupils was viewed, and of particular interest was the classroom where the more advanced school work and speech therapy is carried on. Members took advantage of the invitation to try out the hearing aid equipment with which each classroom seat is equipped. There are usually about twelve pupils in each room. The group was shown how the teacher proceeds to make use of the electronic amplifier, microphone and headphones, the large mirror, blackboard teaching, and the sense of vibration, which enable the students to learn how to communicate by speaking, reading and writing.

It was explained that there are very few completely deaf children. The use of sign language is not encouraged or taught since it would tend to reduce the impetus to learn how to read, write and talk to people who have hearing.

After the tour, the ladies from Georgetown, together with a group from Bronte, assembled in the auditorium, where Mr. Kennedy, Superintendent of the school, the Superintendent of residences, and the department head who tests the hearing and mental capabilities of new pupils, explained how the school, and its different departments operate, and answered any questions asked. Mrs. Gordon Spence, president of the Daughters, expressed the appreciation of the group for the tour.

Afterwards, the ladies were invited to see the offices where the youngsters are tested for hearing and various other abilities before entering the school. The equipment was shown and explained, as were the various methods used to get the desired response from the child being tested. It was pointed out that the hearing tests are free to anyone, adult or child, after a referral from their physician.

**Pictures of Orient Trip Are Shown To Bahais**

On May 19th the Georgetown Bahais and their friends were treated to a travelogue on Hong Kong and Hawaii at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Emmerson. Rowland A. Tolton, Toronto, showed some slides he took one year ago while on a trip to the Orient.

He showed pictures of modern apartment buildings in Hong Kong, twelve stories high - without elevators - which house as many as 23,000 people, and one small room being occupied by as many as twenty. He stated that even under such conditions there is no crime and very little unemployment.

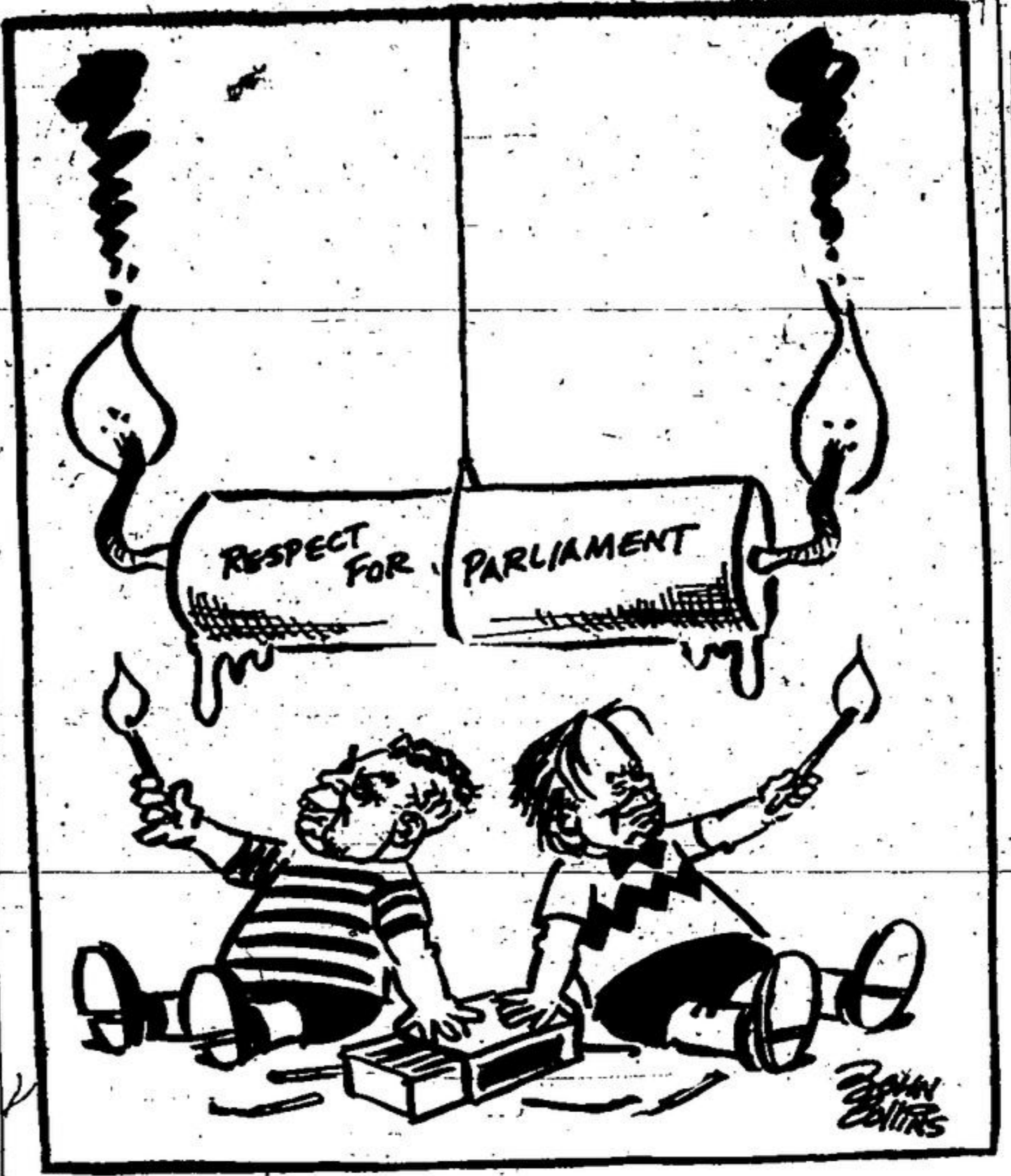
