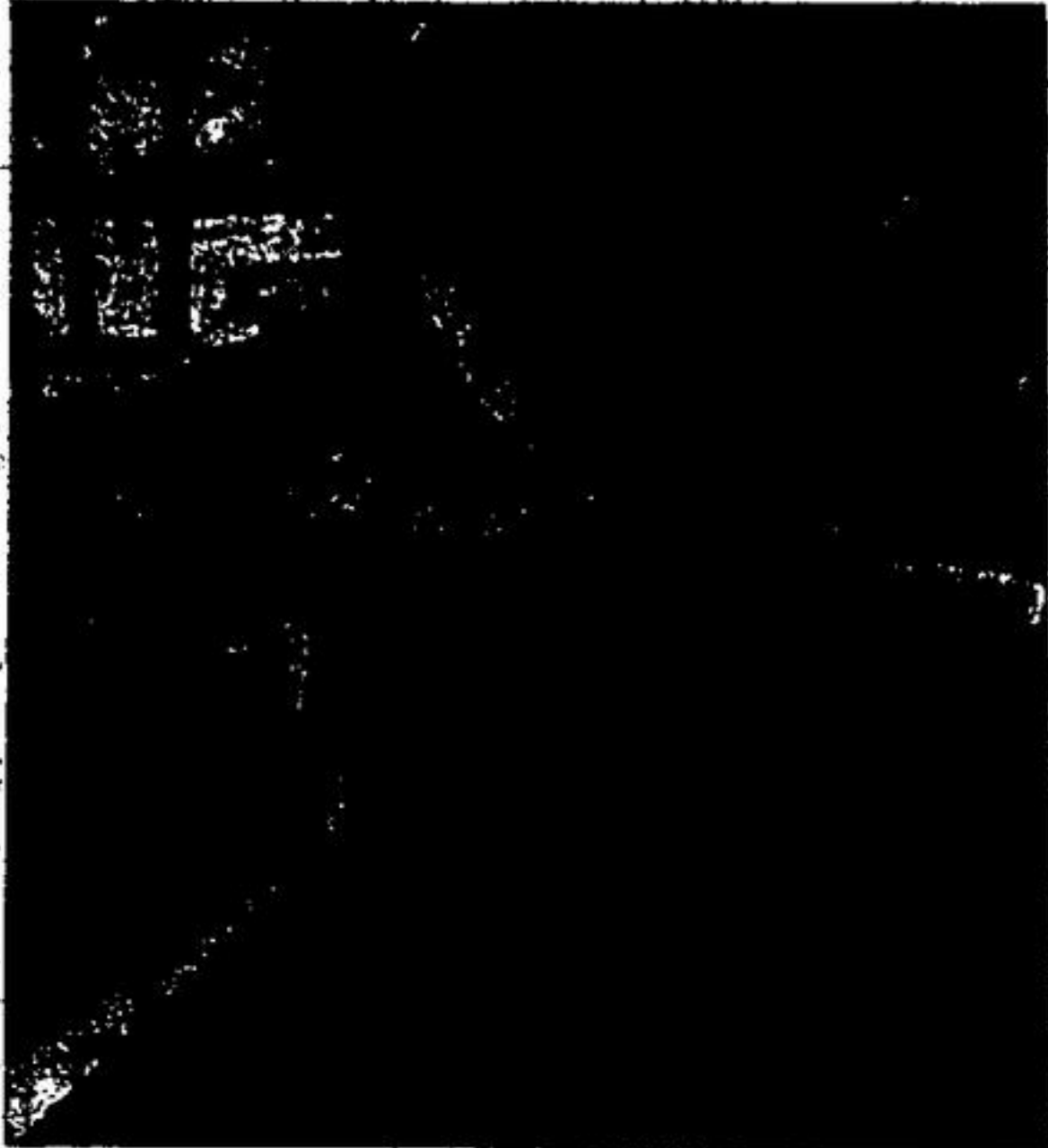


Top School Safety Patrollers Attend Conference in Ottawa

\$108,000 Contract Varnier Firm

OTTAWA Special to the Herald: A Georgetown firm, Varnier Associates of Canada Ltd., has been awarded a contract by the Department of Defence Production, it was announced by industry minister C.M. Duff. The contract, valued at \$1,302, is for the supply of 200,000 tubes. It is one of 164 unclassified defence contracts totalling most \$40 million awarded by the department.
