the province to turn down the 50 per cent federal contribution.

He said he hopes the Commons will be debating the health resources legislation before the end of this month. This legislation provides \$500 million over the next 15 years in training medical personnel.

He said medicare was part of the Liberal party's platform and he is pleased that despite some difficulties, that may arise the government has decided to stick with its original principles and intentions.

**HARLEY PLEASED WITH PLAN**

OTTAWA Special to the Herald

Halton MP Dr. Harry Harley said today that he is very pleased that the federal government has announced its intention to proceed with a national medicare plan by the original target date of July 1, 1967.

"Health minister McEachen's statement yesterday was not a surprise as we expected the government would stick to the target date and would also require the four basic conditions before any provincial plan would be acceptable," Dr. Harley said. "The provinces have now more than one year's advance notice of the government's intention to pay half the cost of such plans and the initiative will rest with the provinces to adapt their plans to fit."

Dr. Harley expressed the personal view that Ontario would change its present OMSIP plan to conform with the basic requirements of the federal plan. He said in the case of Ontario where so much money was involved, it would be difficult for
