### Wants Equal Representation on Regional Jail Board

"I intend to fight for equal representation as long as I'm able," Georgetown Deputy Reeve Jim Young warned Halton County Council Tuesday when discussions turned to the discussions with Peel County on construction of a regional detention centre.

Under present legislation the county with the greatest population is entitled to three representatives on the five man board. This would leave Halton with two.

"This should be one of our prime considerations," Deputy Reeve Young declared.

Confusion developed on the agreement Peel County had adopted and suggestions the Halton jail committee had adopted.

Chairman Reeve G. Gallagher emphasized the Halton committee was trying to develop something satisfactory. He noted Peel had called a meeting of the joint committee and despite the fact only three of eight were present, they proceeded to pass a resolution.

Warden H. Hinton sought to explain the joint jail committee of Halton and Peel had agreed on the services of one solicitor and the agreement resulting was submitted to both counties. Peel had adopted it with alterations, and Halton had not.

Subsequently it was noted Toronto Township had engaged a solicitor as a consultant.

"Representation is the main point, isn't it?" Reeve William Coulter asked.

Warden Hinton suggested the Minister of Reform Institutions had left no doubt in the minds of members the present arrangement for representation would not be changed. "We were assured Halton should have no fear of its position being jeopardized by this representation," the warden concluded.

### County Council Briefs

During Tuesday's regular meeting of Halton County Council members:

• Tenders on vehicles purchased by the Road committee were approved with Elmwood Motors, Port Credit supplying a half ton pick up truck at \$1,146 and a double cab truck at \$2,150. Trafalgar Motors Co., Milton, was the successful bidder on a dump truck at \$2,575.35.

• Tentatively set the date for the annual Warden's dinner at October 26 and named a committee to plan the annual event.

• Approved the installation of oil heating at the old court house on Brown St., Milton, at the low tender price of \$2,611.06. The firm of Whitehead and Worthington was the successful bidder.

### Suggest Atrazine Helpful In Controlling Foxtail


This is an annual grass which creates a serious problem in gardens, cultivated crops and sometimes in first-year meadows.

The stem may be single, or several, and branching at the base. For a grass plant the leaves are quite large and may even be a half inch wide narrowing down to a fine point at the tip. The seed head is a bristly spike two or three inches long, resembling a miniature tail of a fox.

In recent years "foxtail" is tending to build up in the crop rotation. This is mainly due to the lack of competition from many broadleaved weeds which are being removed as a result of 2, 4-D sprays. It however, is not readily controlled by the 2, 4-D chemicals.

Foxtail, is quite often a problem in the corn crop. The seeds germinate mainly between May 15 and June 15, so that early spring and late summer cultivation has little effect on control. Atrazine at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 lbs. (active) in 20-30 gallons of water per acre as an early post-emergence overall spray is recommended. However, under dry conditions the atrazine may not penetrate down deeply enough into the soil to kill all germinating weeds. In this case shallow cultivations may be required. However many farmers report that Atrazine is quite effective in controlling foxtail. In direct seedings of pure Alfalfa or Birdsfoot Trefoil "Foxtail" can be controlled by a chemical called Dalapon. This would require a spray of about 4 lbs. of Dalapon per acre in 10-20 gals. of water. It should be applied when the legumes have 2 or 3 true leaves. It must be remembered that this can only be done on direct seedings of the legumes. If forage grasses such as timothy, orchard or broom are seeded do not use Dalapon.

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
