

Egg Producers Cry "Foul" At Attempt To Down Price

Seven egg dealers have set out to lower the producer price of eggs by importing eggs from Mexico, the Halton County Egg Producers Association was told Monday night.

C. A. Loomis, secretary-treasurer of the Ontario Egg and Poultry Producers Marketing Board, stated the importation is a 'deliberate attempt' to depress the price of eggs.

He said one dealer has imported 2,000 cases (with 30 dozen to a case) from Mexico in the last three weeks. The dealers are mainly from the Toronto area. Two are in Halton.

"The supply of eggs from Ontario producers is quite adequate for the needs in Ontario," Mr. Loomis told the 23 producers in the agricultural office. "Importing more only causes a surplus and will lower the prices."

The secretary-treasurer noted that eggs have been imported regularly from Manitoba where the cost of production is lower than in Ontario. Manitoba eggs haven't posed a threat to the market though, he added.

Halton producers have been affected by the importing, stated Don Lindsay, of Georgetown, president of the Halton County Egg Producers Association.

"Local farmers sell to these dealers but since the importation many have had to seek other markets," Mr. Lindsay said. "This generally means a lower price."

In the same herd Rosegate Castor Lady 2 — (Very Good) — a Jersey cow, has just been issued a Ton of Gold Certificate. In 1434 days she produced 2,516 lbs. of fat. Lady 2 is a daughter of the Senior Superior Sire Kingshurst Really Royal Castor — and also a winner of 3 Silver Medals, 2 Gold Medals, 1 Medal of Merit.

In the herd of D. H. McGeig & Son, Norval, the Jersey cow Brampton Myrtle Carom — (Very Good) — also received a Ton of Gold certificate. In 1461 days she produced 2,042 lbs. of fat. Myrtle Carom is a daughter

To qualify for a Ton of Gold certificate a cow must produce at least 2,000-lbs. of fat in four consecutive years.

Four Months at Hard Labour Sentence For Assaulting Child

A husky 32-year-old former Georgetown truck driver was sentenced Wednesday morning to four months hard labour in prison for assaulting his five-year-old daughter and causing her bodily harm. The attack took place while the family was living in Georgetown.

Crown Attorney Peter McWilliams described the assault as "barbaric" and "disgraceful".

He asked Magistrate James Black to use the sentence as a deterrent to other parents who might abuse their children.

The offence occurred June 20, 1965.

The accused said he could not get back from Montreal because he had had no car and had been living off the welfare system for a year.

Mr. McWilliams said the child was found in an "awful" state. "The injuries to her head might well have resulted in very serious harm," he added.

He said the accused claimed the child had been a troublemaker from the time she was born. "This disqualifies him from any consideration as a loving parent," he added.

He said the man had displayed a general attitude of hate towards the child which resulted in a persistent pattern of beatings.

"It was hardly necessary to beat the child to that degree," he said.

Mr. McWilliams said the court should consider passing a sentence which would deter others from "the same sort of disgraceful and barbaric conduct."

He added: "this is a measure of the civilization of our free country."

Magistrate Black said the court would be the first to uphold the parental right of correction, including physical correction if necessary.

"But it would also be the first to deny the rights of unnecessary force by any person in the correction of any child."

He said the accused had not shown the slightest concern about the girl since he was charged. The child had been staying with foster parents and appeared to be quite happy with them, he said.

Magistrate Black said the accused's type of correction was unnecessary and added: "The court finds that you exceeded any reasonable method of parental correction and inflicted assault on the child with unnecessary force."

"It was beyond the bounds of normal parental correction," he said.

At an earlier hearing evidence was given by the child's mother and a doctor to show that the girl had a "mass of bruises" on the left side of her face. Her left ear was also swollen. Her left eye was blistered and bruised.

There was also evidence given that the child had suffered marks of earlier beatings.
