Giants Score Victory in Season's Home Ball Debut

Georgetown Giants registered their first victory of the 1966 Halton County Senior Baseball campaign Wednesday night, a 3-2 squeaker over Burlington in Georgetown park.

The game became Georgetown's home opener when a games schedule with Campbellville last week was rained out. The locals bowed to Preston Pirates on Saturday, May 21st.

Don Westbrook, making his first start on the hill, fanned 12, walked just 2 and gave up just 4 hits in going to within 2 outs of the entire 7 innings. Bernie Dore came on to retire the last two Burlington batters.

Georgetown hitters got to the offerings of Burlington hurler Don Lynch for 7 hits, walked 3 times and struck out twice.

Georgetown bunched their safeties to score in each of the 4th, 5th, and 6th frames after Burlington ran up a 2-0 edge in the 4th.

Burlington got a single from left fielder Sharp, followed by a double by first sacker Clarke in their scoring inning. Sharp scored on Clarke's 2-bagger and the outfielder stole home with the second run.

A single by right fielder Denny Gibbon, a double by second baseman Jason Field, and a single by first baseman Bill Campbell produced Giants 4th inning run.

Westbrook's single, third-sacker, Dan Arbie's double and short stop Pete Lawson's single pushed the tying run across in inning 5. Catcher Jim Lindsay was hit with a pitch to lead off the 6th. Campbell singled and Jim James hit a two-bagger to bring him the rest of the way around with the winners.

Campbell was Georgetown's most effective hitter with two singles in 3 trips to the plate and 2 RBI's. Pete Lawson was credited with the other RBI.

RESCUE BREATHING (MOUTH-TO-MOUTH)

THE CANADIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY

1. TURN VICTIM FACE UP. RAISE neck with one hand and TILT head fully back with the other hand.

2. OPEN victim's mouth. PULL lower jaw to put position. PINCH nostrils shut to prevent air leakage. MAINTAIN downward pressure on forehead.

3. PLACE mouth lightly around victim's mouth and BLOW IN. The victim's chest should rise.

4. REMOVE your mouth. RELEASE victim's nostrils. LISTEN for air to come out of victim's lungs. LOOK for the fall of the victim's chest. PINCH NOSTRILS AND BLOW IN AGAIN.

REPEAT steps 3 and 4 continuously. IF AIR PASSAGES ARE NOT OPEN: CHECK neck and head positions, CLEAR mouth and throat of foreign substances.

Start immediately. Don't give up. Send someone for a doctor.

For infants and children, cover entire mouth and nose with your mouth. Use small puffs of air about 20 times per minute.

Apply rescue breathing in case of DROWNING, CHOKING, ELECTRIC SHOCK, HEART ATTACK, SUFFOCATION and GAS POISONING.
