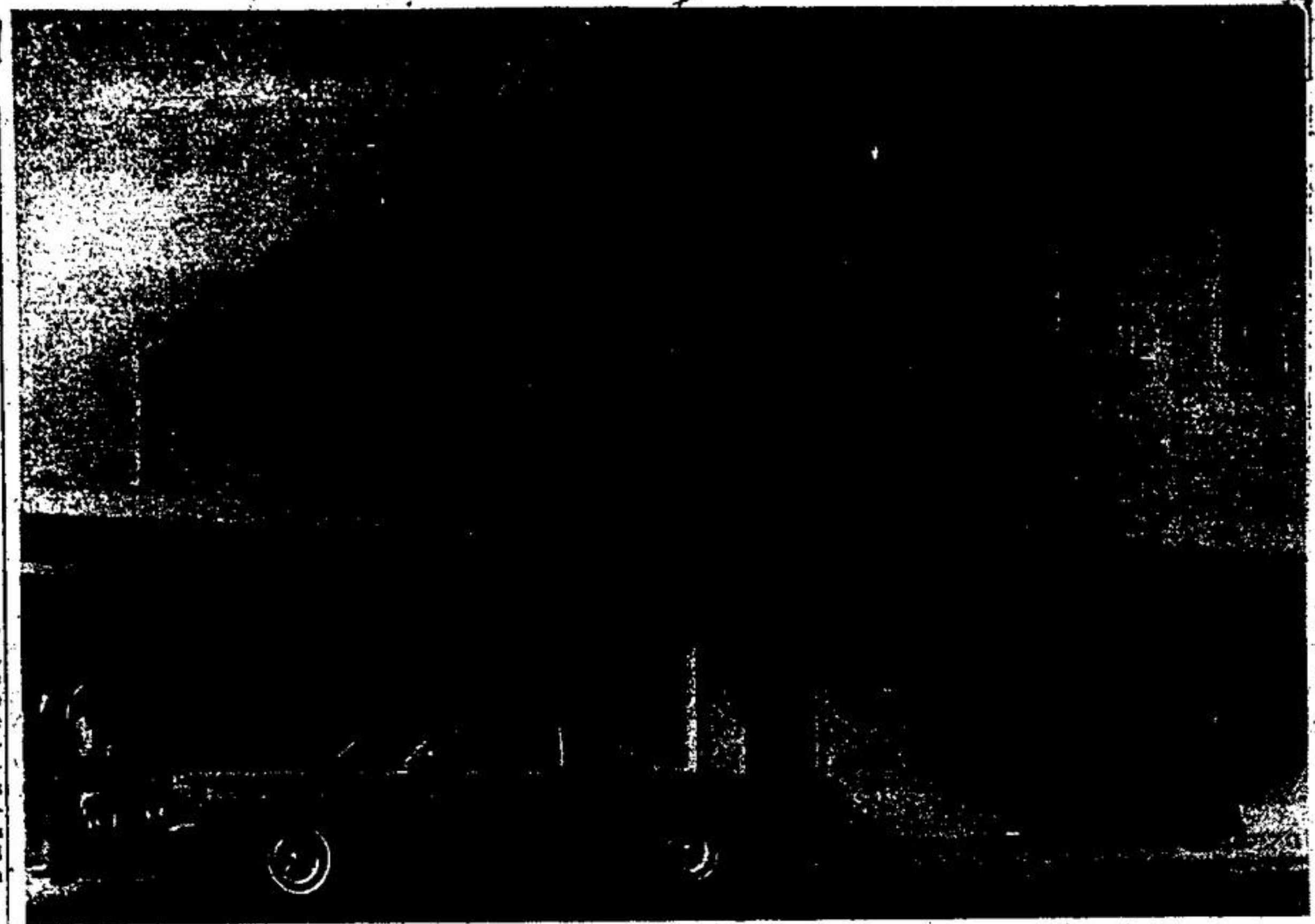
Mr. A. C. McBride, the town treasurer, who was present, explained that another firm had been coming into town without a license, but had been checked up, and had paid the \$50 license fee.
