

Esqueuing School Operation Costs Nearly Half Million

Esqueuing taxpayers have been asked for \$192,760 as the local tax levy share of the Esqueuing Area Public School Board's 1966 budget released to the press this week.

The budget totals \$450,368 this year of which over half, \$244,162, will go for teachers' salaries. Second largest item on the expense side of the budget is \$58,122 for transportation.

Second Jail Break Prisoner Recaptured

The second prisoner to escape from the Halton County Jail in less than two months made a run for it Friday night.

The 26-year-old Hamilton man apparently pried open the bars of a cell block with a water pipe at about 5:30 p.m. to make his escape, but two hours later he was back behind bars.

The man was awaiting trial by a judge on a break and entry charge. He appeared before Magistrate Kenneth Langdon May 12 jointly charged with another Hamilton man for breaking into Campbellville Gravel Supply Ltd.

Robert Morley of Milton, alerted police when his suspicions were aroused by a man running along the Sixteen Mile Creek near his home.

The arrest was made by off-duty OPP officer Thomas Dobby, and on-duty constable Ross Woods of Burlington.

On March 15 another prisoner escaped from the jail by sawing through cell bars with back-saw blades he carried in a book.

Jail Governor E.G. Ryder had been reprimanded for laxity following the first jail break and told to tighten security measures.
